That last second pass from quarterback Bill Hurley to fullback Mike Hanna two weeks ago at Holleder Stadium not only kept McQuaid's unbeaten string alive (at that time five games), not only dropped Cardinal Mooney from first place in the City-Catholic League as well as from the ranks of the unbeaten, but jumped coach Tom Seymour's valiant Knights from honorable mention in the state high school ratings to seventh. (McQuaid nipped Mooney, 9-8).

Mooney, which had been fifth best in the state, dropped to 20th.

McQuaid also replaced Mooney as No. 1 in the local coaches' poll while the Cards dropped to fourth. McQuaid was ranked fourth the week before.

The Knights proved with a doubt that the best way to become No. 1 is to beat No. 1.

McQuaid wasn't able to rest on its laurels — the Knights had a Saturday date with Madison whose only previous loss was to Mooney.

(Madison upset McQuaid, at McQuaid).

Leading McQuaid's high scoring offense, tops in the City-Catholic League at the midway point, were tailback Roger Key and Hanna.

Key and Mooney's Tony Shaw were tied for C-C scoring honors after five games each with 72 points. Key had scored 12 TD's for his 72 points; Shaw tallied 10 TD's and ran 12 extra points.

Hanna had five touchdowns for 30 points, but his game-ending TD against Mooney was the most important score of his career.

The victory was the biggest, certainly, of Seymour's career.

We can't imagine even McQuaid's win over arch-rival Aquinas a decade ago in the first football match ever between the two schools eclipsing the Knights' great win over Mooney.

PRESEASON guesstimates of how McQuaid would fare were optimistic in light of last year's 4-4 season.

Seymour described his team as being light on depth, but heavy on talent.

Six seniors returned from last year: Key, Hanna, Mike Delagrange, Bill Runicman, Lou Seymour and Matt Teddy.

Seymour said then if the Knights could avoid injuries and develop a passing attack to complement the anticipated running attack, McQuaid might be a contender.

The Knights are definitely a contender and they are presently in the driver's seat. And, they're No. 1 in the Rochester coaches' poll.

Mooney coach Tony Merola won't deny McQuaid its due. "They were fired up, they played the best they could and they beat us," Merola said.

Tony pointed out, however, that Mooney led the Knights for some 47 minutes and 56 seconds.

"If they're No. 1," Merola cracked, "then we gotta be 1.5."

WHILE FOOTBALL is going great guns at the Elmwood Avenue campus, soccer is keeping pace.

Coach Bob Armstrong's pitchmen were tied with East and Franklin for top spot in C-C soccer after Franklin's upset loss to Marshall and McQuaid's win over Edison in recent play.

The Knights are led by Mackenzie Mbinda, who hails from Kenya, and who got two goals against Edison.

McQuaid won eight of its first nine games and seems to be headed for its most successful soccer season ever.

During one stretch the Knights won three in a row, all by one goal—4-3 over Bishop Kearney, 1-0 over Marshall and 1-0 over Harley/Allendale-Columbia.

Tom Hanshaw was the leading Knights' scorer with 10 goals through McQuaid's first nine games.

Joe DiMaggio is a really shy guy who shadows his old roomie Lefty Gomez when the two are together on the banquet trail. In Rochester for the recent Kodak Celebrity Golf Classic, DiMag kept urging Gomez to "Tell 'em about that one, Lefty."

One that sounded like a new story was about the very young pitcher from a very small town on his first day in Yankee Stadium in front of 70,000 fans. The rookie was Gomez and he was in the bullpen praying that starter Herb Pennock wouldn't need any rescue work.

Eighth inning. Strikeout. Base hit. Base on balls. Line drive back to the box off Pennock's kneecap, and manager Bob Shawkey is out to the mound signaling for Gomez to come in from the pen.

"It was a long trip," recalled Gomez, heading toward his first major league pitching assignment. He tried to look calm and cool.

"How do you want me to pitch this first batter, Skip?" blurted Gomez.

"Hey, kid, I don't want you to pitch to anybody. Pennock broke the webbing in his glove. Just give him yours and get back to the bullpen."

It is a baseball fact that pitchers don't get away with throwing fast balls high, or "up" in game parlance. DiMaggio was watching the Orioles Jim Palmer strike out a fistful of Oakland A's — with fastballs, "up."

"He's not really getting away with anything," explained the former Yankee great and A's batting coach. "When a pitcher

strikes people out with fastballs high, he's really delivering an exceptional pitch. What he's throwing is a super fastball that has something on it that makes it move all over. It's one of the most deceptive things about pitching. Or hitting."

DiMaggio says Charlie Finley, the owner of the A's, spends about half his free time figuring out new ways to fire people.

QUOTE AND UNQUOTE: Someone asked D.C. Nobles, the very talented black quarterback how it felt to be a black quarterback on a football team in the South? "I really don't know," answered Nobles, "because I've never been a white quarterback on a team down South." After the A's beat the O's in the American League playoffs, veteran Brooks Robinson of Baltimore was asked whether he felt he was getting any slower? "I only have one speed," responded Brooks, "and it's never changed. That gear is very slow." Montreal manager Gene Mauch, talking about how the Los Angeles Dodgers moved far out in front in the National League West, and then finished a poor second to the Cincinnati Reds, but still wound up with an excellent won-lost record: "Losing streaks are funny things," explained Mauch. Catholic Unit Campaigns For Aid for War Veterans

New York [RNS] — Msgr. John G. Nolan, president of the Pontifical Mission for Palestine and national secretary of the Catholic Near East Welfare Association, has issued an appeal for donations of relief supplies for victims of the Middle East war.

V Hakim has converted one of the orphanages in Damascus, Syria, into a 50-bed hospital, and is seeking cots, medical supplies, and nurses for it.

Msgr. Nolan said that donations of supplies for his agencies should be sent to Catholic Relief Services, 73-25 Woodhaven Blvd., Glendale, N.Y.

He said that the area office of the Pontifical Mission in Beirut, Lebanon, has a daily increasing demand for clothing, blankets, shoes, hospital equipment, medicine, and anti-biotics.

According to Msgr. Nolan, the association's two medical teams of nuns — the Franciscan Missionaries of the Divine Motherhood and the Missionaries of Charity (Mother Teresa's Sisters) — have asked not to be evacuated no matter what happens.

A report from the Beirut office of the Pontifical Mission indicated that Lebanon has opened its borders to war victims and made its hospital facilities available to them.
