Guests of honor will be the Most Rev. Philip Saliba, Archbishop of the Antiochan Archdiocese of North America, and Msgr. John Nolan, president of the Pontifical Mission to Palestine and secretary of the Catholic Near East Welfare Association.

Msgr. Nolan will speak at all Masses at St. Stephen's, begin-ning at 5:30 p.m. Saturday, At 7:30 p.m. Sunday, he will lecture at St. Francis de Sales auditorium on the work of his organizations; that "serve need; not creed."

Archbishop Saliba will officiate at St. Michael's Syrian Orthodox Church. Both will be guests at a public luncheon at St. Peter's Episcopal Church, 1-2:30 p.m. Tickets, at \$2.50, are available at all the churches.

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
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
