Delay Sought In Implementing Rome Directive

St. Paul, Minn. [RNS] — A delay in implementing the Vatican directive requiring Roman Catholic children to make their first Confession before they take their first Communion has been requested by the Priests' Senate of the Archdiocese of St. Paul-Minneapolis.

The Senate voted to ask Archbishop Coadjutor Leo C. Byrne to "suspend implications" of his letter requesting parishes to comply with the Vatican directive effective with the 1973-74 school year.

About half of the 215 parishes in the archdiocese were reported to have adopted experimental practice of permitting children to receive their first Communion about two years before they made their first confession. The practice also had been followed widely in other areas.

Many priests, educators and parents here criticized the directive and the six Catholic parishes in Bloomington and Richfield received permission from Archbishop Byrne to continue the "Communion before Penance" plan for another year.

Halberstam, whose most recent book is a study of political power

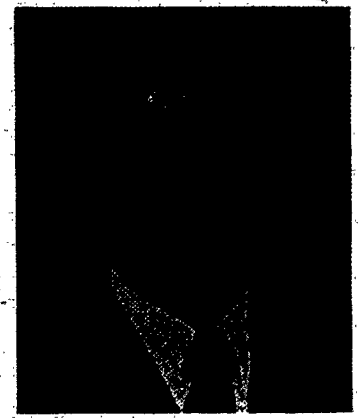
