Carl Steinfeldt, who left the general manager's post of the Rochester Red Wings for a similar spot with the Charleston Charlies, admits there's a big challenge waiting for him there.

The Charlies, winner of the International League's National Division crown this past season, drew only 93,000 fans through its turnstiles while the Red Wings drew more than 300,000.

A member of St. Cecelia's Parish in Irondequoit, Steinfeldt said he hopes the Charleston media are as kind to his new ball club as were the Rochester media to the Red Wings.

Steinfeldt estimated more than a million fans saw Red Wing games during his three year tenure as Red Wing GM. He was graduated from West High and went to RIT, but didn't finish his business administration courses.

Instead he earned his degree under Morrie Silver and Bob Turner at 400 Norton St.

McQUAID's membership among the state's Top 20 football teams was short-lived.

The Knights took over seventh spot after nipping the Cards, 9-8, and Mooney dropped from fifth to 20th. McQuaid previously had been honorable mention.

After Madison edged McQuaid, 22-14, the Knights dropped back to honorable mention and Mooney's 50-0 win over Edison (highest score in Mooney history) moved the Cards back to 13th.

In other state school sports, sophomore Dick Craft of Elmira Notre Dame made the state's record books with a 40 yard field goal, his fourth in five tries this season.

Syracuse CBA topped Syracuse Bishop Grimes, 26-30, to gain its 13th Central N.Y. Cities League cross country title in 14 seasons.

Paul Rachetta of Syracuse Henninger scored 31 goals in three straight games including 12 goals in one game. He has 54 goals in 10 games, possibly a national U.S. high school scoring mark for one season. Henninger has won its last 47 league games.

A STATEWIDE scholastic athletic association which for the first time includes all high schools in New York State has been created to enhance the educational and athletic opportunities of participating youngsters, according to reporter Marc Bloom.

The group is called the Federation of New York State High School Athletic Associations and brings together under one umbrella the New York State Public High School Athletic Association (of which Section 5 is a member), the New York State Catholic High Schools Athletic League (including N.Y. City Catholic schools); the Public Schools Athletic League of New York City; and several private schools' organizations.

The federation paves the way for the first official state championship competitions in virtually all individual sports and some team sports, Bloom said.

DeSALES of Geneva set a scoring mark for most points in a football game when the Saints pasted Romulus, 50-0.

The Saints, who hiked their record to 3-1-1 in Wayne-Finger Lakes League Western Division action, didn't score in the opening period but led, 14-0, 43-0 and 50-0 at the whistle-stops.

Brian McDonald, Bernie Hendricks and Dave Rickey each scored twice for DeSales.
