MISSION RECRUITER

"Ismail was brought to us by his father. He was just a baby and suffering from severe malnutrition. The mother, we were told had died."

Thus the missioner began her story about a Uganda boy who was rescued repeatedly from the hardships of life with relatives who did not really want him.

"He is now three and a half years old, a veteran of much experience for his years. His future is very uncertain," she concluded.

This is just one of many stories Sister Mary Fisher, a Franciscan Missionary Sister from Africa, can tell you. After several years in Uganda, East Africa, she recently returned to the states and is on a speaking tour as vocation director for her order.

Sister helped train villagers seeking work in industrial towns, in steel mills, cloth, cigarette and match factories and breweries. One such town, situated at the source of the Nile River, is Jinga. Sister worked in Jinga in one of the nine Franciscan missionary institutes in Africa. She taught community development, mostly working with youth and women, giving classes in typing, shorthand, English, sewing, cooking, reading, crafts, writing, nutrition, hygiene and child care. There are more than 700 abandoned children living there, she said.

Sister Mary has been in the Ithaca area for the past few weeks, speaking in schools,

or three years of service. There is work in rehabilitation and centers for the blind; catechetical work and child care. There are needs for workers, teachers at all paramedics, doctors and for missions in Ethiopia, Zambia, Union of South and Uganda.
