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Pontiff Urges Reflection As He Opens Holy Year

Rome [RNS] - Celebrations for Holy Year in Rome were opened by Pope Paul, as Bishop of Rome, at the Basilica of St. John Lateran.

In a highly personal homily delivered without written text, the pontiff said the Holy Year was to serve as an occasion for Christian "self-definition," of "telling ourselves what we are in reality.

"What does it mean for us to be Christians?" he asked. "How do we wish to live in rapport with God, to measure our obligation to become 'new men' and to be reconciled with others in a spirit of generosity and charity, a charity that unites us with all the People of God?"

The Pope then said, "Who is it who is now speaking? It is a poor religious, laity — "to look deeply

MPAA Film Ratings: The First Five Years

New York [CPF] — The motion icture industry's selfpicture classification system has just marked the end of its first five years of operation, with indications of growing acceptance on the part of the American public.

Cumulative figures compiled by the Motion Picture Association of America, which Picture administers the ratings of G, PG, R and X, verifies what many have suspected, a small number of G (for the entire family) films have been made in the past five years.

75 per cent of all films rated in the past five years.

The interface between PG and R is the most critical, though it gets less publicity and heat than the X rating," Variety noted, referring to the fact that many observers often wonder why a PG film was not rated R, and vice versa.


Addressing himself to the priests present, the pontiff invited them "at this time of soulsearching and self-criticism," to "enter into a deeper un-derstanding of your vocation," and to "live your priesthood to its fulness."

"Let us understand our vocation," he said. "Perhaps we too have experienced moments of confusion, of weakness, criticism, and protest." He added that some priests today had become harsh critics of their, calling and were undermining their mission.

Speaking then to today's youth, "in particular those who have felt the voice of Christ's calling echo in them," Pope Paul said: "Indeed, it is young people who are the best candidates for the Christian life — young people who refuse the absurdities of the opulent life."

He urged young people to search for the "deeper values" in everyday life by seeking them in Christ. Christ alone, he said, has "the words of eternal life," and it is only in Him that young people will find "the reality for which they are anxiously searching."

In concluding his homily, the Pope once again reminded the congregation that the call of Holy Year was a call to "conversion" and "reconciliation," and to "peace."

The largest grouping of films — 38 per cent — is found in the PG category, which means that all ages are admitted but that "parental guidance" is suggested. The PG was applied to 938 films in the five years.

Close behind the PG category was the R category (no one under 17 admitted without parent or adult guardian), which went to 876 films,
