Topic: Infant Death

Dr. Marie A. Valdes-Dapena of Philadelphia, a vice president of the National Foundation for Sudden Infant Death, Inc., [SID] was one of the speakers at a Nov. 14 Symposium on SID for public health officials and others at Temple Sinai. The symposium was sponsored by the Genesee Valley Chapter of the national group. SID, or crib death, is the unexplained death of a seemingly healthy baby and occurs most frequently in the first two to six months. Doctors are continuing research to uncover the cause.
