Dear Father Hohman;


I am writing to you because I think all Catholic people should informed about be the charismatic movement.



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Dear M.G.

May I just make some observations on your letter:

* The charismatic movement is acceptable within the Church and numbers many holy people.

* The process you went through (with the exception of speaking in tongues and ordinarily healings) is nothing more or less the normal process of conversion to a spiritual life. Saints through the ages have undergone the same process. You have simply used the medium of the charismatic movement to produce the same effect.

* If you'll pardon my saying so, I do wonder about the reality of your conversion. Jesus said "Blessed are they who suffer persecution," apparently you wilted under the first onslaught. Shouldn't your union with Christ have sustained you through that rather than make you cop out?
