At: a recent gathering of physicians the group was warned that unless the situation changes the time will soon come when "doctors will be competing for patients."

According to the doctor speakers, slews of paramedical people are being turned out of schools trained to do many relatively simple but time-consuming chores for patients that heretofore only a bona-fide physician could do:

Consequently the incomes of doctors are being threatened, and their educations (which cost \$100,000 per person) on the verge of being wasted. Or so say the speakers.

Doctors competing for patients? The idea is mind boggling but after the initial 'shock anyone who has had the need to consult a doctor in the last five years must necessarily brighten at the prospect.

For at the present time and in the most recent years the situation may quite accurately be described as the reverse. Patients are literally competing for doctors. Their incomes and education are not at stake, but their health and their very lives.

If you are fortunate enough to have a doctor of your own who will see you when you are sick, try scheduling a physical. If you can get in an appointment in six months time consider yourself lucky Most doctors are so swamped with sick people, those not conspicuously ill must wait for attention:

If you have moved in the last year, as nearly all of our neighbors have in the new development in which we live, getting a doctor for even the most serious illness may take a miracle.

A friend several houses away called one morning recently saying she believed she was seriously ill and asking if we have doctor.

Yes, we told her, but because ome other recent arrivals had already tried him we knew he had not taken any new patients in more than a year.

gave her two other doctors' names along with the suggestion to ask them to recommend a doctor if they were not taking new patients. An hour later I called to check with her and she said nurses for both doctors had turned her down and said they patients in our city. Before she got a chance to ask one if the doctor would see her just this once on an emergency basis the nurse hung up on her.
