Vatican to Help Poor Pilgrims For Holy Year

Rome [RNS] — The Vatican's Central Commission for the Holy Year announced that it is planning to assist poor pilgrims coming to Rome during 1975.

It will work with an inter-ministerial group set up by the Italian government to handle the expected influx of visitors from all over the world.

Msr. Antonio Mazza, general secretary of the Holy Year Commission, said in a report following a meeting of the Vatican agency that he has contacted episcopal conferences, national committees, individual bishops, offices of the Vatican, and particularly liturgical organizations to discuss Rome's problems in connection with the Holy Year.

He said that organizational and logistical problems concerning the presence of large crowds of pilgrims in Rome were discussed at length with the inter-ministerial committee.

Commenting on the reactions of non-Catholics to the Holy Year decreed in June, 1973, by Pope Paul, Msr. Mazza said the responses he has received are "on the whole, positive."

Noting that the commission plans to assist "poor pilgrims," especially catechists, coming to Rome from around the world, he urged local Catholic dioceses, parishes and organization to assist pilgrims as much as possible.
