Schaeffer, not a Catholic, thought enough of this resolution to express hope that the Courier-Journal, which is the foremost religious outlet in this part of the state, would spread its ideology to its readers.

He is right. To me the resolution is astounding in its pinpointing of the source of many, if not all, of our social ills. I know not who originally authored its prose but it is remarkable in its content and thought.

In its deference to the Deity, it is remindful of the Declaration of Independence, which calls on God Almighty to help this nation. It is tactful, making no reference to Christian values per set thus not ignoring Americans of other religious persuasions. Yet it does not shrink an iota in its allegiance to our-Creator.

In a future edition of the Courier-Journal we will print in the full the resolution as it appeared in the Congressional Record, But for this column let me quote some of the more cogent comments:

"Intoxicated with unbroken success, we have become too self-sufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace too proud to pray to the God that made us

"It therefore behooves us to humble ourselves before Almighty God to confess our national sins and to pray for clemency and forgiveness

These are God-fearing words even more important they are God-recognizing words that are needed at all times but even more at this shaky period in our nation's history. They add up to a particularly worthwhile endeavor,

She is the present secretary-treasurer of Region II LCWR, the organization of the major superiors of women of New York State.

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
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
