Guatemalan Bishops Hit larassment of Missionaries

Guatemala's Roman Catholic bishops joined an ecumenical group of 27 Christian leaders in government protesting harassment foreign missionaries and uncontrolled violence during recent elections.

In a public letter to Guatemala's President Carlos Arana Osorio, the bishops condemned the government for condemned the government for ordering the expulsion of 11 Catholic missionaries on charges of meddling in the elections. They called the government's action "arbitrary and unjust" and asked the president to reverse the expulsion order.

President Arana Osorio reportedly has refused the bishops' demand.

Three of the missionaries ordered to leave the country are reportedly members of Maryknoll the Catholic Foreign

Mission Society of America, with headquarters in New York. The priests are Father William Price, 49, of Syracuse, N.Y.; Father Thomas Fox, 45, Bronx, N.Y.; and Father Joseph Towle, 36, of East Weymouth, Mass. All are assigned to the Huehuetenango diocese, headed by Maryknoll Bishop Hugo Gerbermann of Nada, Tex.

(A spokesman for Maryknoll headquarters at Ossining, N.Y., could not confirm that the number of missionaries ordered expelled had reached 11. He indicated that the three Maryknoll priests are still in Guatemala and that negotiations with the government are continuing.)

A week before the Catholic bishops' statement, the 27 Christian clergy and lay persons, both Catholic and Protestant, signed an eight-point protest. Among the points of protest

Catholics Up Donations For Latin America Aid

Washington, D.C. [RNS] — Encouraging trends' in U.S. Roman Catholic Church aid to Latin America were noted in a report issued here. It revealed that more than \$6.5 million was allocated during 1973 to implement religious and social restructuring.

In a report prepared by the U.S. Catholic Conference's Division for *Latin America, Father Frederick McGuire, CM, division director, said "the total U.S. Church contribution to programs in Latin America shows a steady increase in recent years which is a tribute to the generosity and concern of Catholics in this country."

The USCC report was prepared at the request of the Committee for the Church in Latin America of the National Conference of Catholic Bishops. The committee is headed by Cardinal Humberto Medeiros of Boston.


The report observed that in 1972, U.S. Catholics contributed a

total of \$4,558,015 to projects in Latin America, and that the 1973 contribution exceeded that figure by more than \$2.3 million. The 1973 National Collection for Latin America totaled \$1,574,614, up \$66,452 from 1972

Father McGuire said the amount and pattern of U.S. Catholic contributions to Latin America indicate that some encouraging trends are apparently forming.
