Canandaigua — Council 1445 of the Knights of Columbus honored priests, Sisters and seminarians of the area at a recent dinner.

These individual awards totaled \$1,100.

**St. Monica's Sets Sacrament of Hope In Afternoon Mass**

In Catholic folk-lore, the idea of "anointing" is associated with the angel of death. But to the parishioners of St. Monica's Church, anointing will be a harbinger of hope as they celebrate the rite during a 3 p.m. Mass April 28.

Father Ronald Stacy, associate pastor of St. Monica's, explained that since Vatican II the sacrament, once called Extreme Unction and used only in critical situations, has been refocused to be administered to the sick and the aged.

"Since it is a sacrament of hope, why wait til you've lost all hope?" he questioned.

The thrust of the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick has become one of hope, healing and strength. "It gives them the courage to face what's ahead," explained Sister Barbara Moore, pastoral assistant for the parish. A person of any age who is sick may be anointed and there is no limit to the number of times a person may be anointed. The definition of old age remains a "touchy subject," she noted.

"Many people do not like to admit that they are approaching old age," Sister Barbara said. She is encouraging her father, who is 80 years old and continues to work seven days a week, to become anointed.

St. Monica's has been engaged in an active campaign to educate its members to the sacrament and its new rite and translation. Articles were published in the church bulletin, homilies were devoted to the idea of concern for the sick and personal invitations were issued to the parishioners.

Father Stacy emphasized that the concept is not new but is a return to the original intention of the Sacrament. Quoting St. James 5:14, he said: "Is there any among you who are sick? Let him bring in the presbyters of the Church and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord."

Invitations have been extended to the five churches in the southwest region and to the three bishops. Families and friends of the aged and sick have been encouraged to attend as a sign of solidarity since the sacrament stresses the community rather than the individual approach to religion.

Transportation may be arranged by calling the church. Refreshments will be served after Mass.

The parish school children will witness the ceremony to see that "it is not a fearful sacrament," Sister Barbara said.

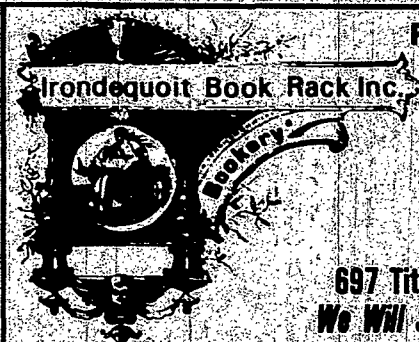
