Seminary Librarian To Be Ordained

The Rev. Jasper Green Pennington, librarian and associate professor at St. Bernard's Seminary, will be ordained a priest of the Episcopal Church this Saturday, May 4, by Bishop Robert R. Spears. The service will begin at 7:30 p.m. at the Church of the Ascension, Lake Avenue at Riverside Drive.

The Very Rev. Joseph P. Brennan, rector of St. Bernard's will be the preacher. Lectors will be Prof. Joseph C. Kelly of St. Bernard's, the Rev. Dr. John Charles Wynn of Colgate, Rochester/Bexley Hall/Crozer Theological Schools, and the Rev. Mr. William F. Laird, a student at St. Bernard's.

Presentors will be the Rev. Walter E. Muir, Ascension rector, the Rev. Joseph A. Pelham, dean of students at the theological complex, Mrs. Pennington and two other members of the Ascension congregation, Mr. and Mrs. Ivan D. Newman.

Father Pennington, an assistant at the Church of the Ascension, will celebrate the Holy Eucharist there at 10 a.m. Sunday, May 5, and at 8 a.m. the following Sunday. His cousin, Father M.

The new priest is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter C. Pennington of Clio, Mich. He and his wife, Carole, and their two children, live in Malden Street.

He received the Master of Divinity degree in 1973 from St. Luke's Seminary, University of the South, Seawee, Tenn. Earlier, he had taken a bachelor's degree in music and history and a master's in library science at Western Michigan University.

Assembly OKs 'Limited' Death Penalty

Albany [RNS] — The New York State Assembly, by a vote of 49 to 51, passed a measure which would reinstate the death penalty in limited cases. The bill now goes to the Senate.

Under the proposed bill, the death penalty would be mandatory for the murder of a peace officer or of an employee of a local or state correctional institution during the performance of duty.

The death penalty would also be mandatory for the murder of an individual by a prisoner serving a life sentence, while the inmate was in prison or during an escape.

An amendment to the bill, which would have allowed the death penalty for the murder of almost anyone, was overwhelmingly defeated by the Assembly. Action on the main bill came after more than six hours of emotional debate.

Courier Wins CPA Honors

"Strange Role for a Priest," a Courier-Journal editorial criticizing Father John McLaughlin, SJ, for working on the presidential staff, won the Catholic Press Association second prize for 1973; it was announced last week in Denver.

In making the award, the judges commented, "Excellent observations on a priest who seems to have put political ambitions above moral principles. Everyone knows that Watergate scandals are the worst this country has faced. When people cannot turn to a priest for moral leadership, little hope is to be found — except in courageous editorials such as this one."

"It is good to see a newspaper refuse to play the little games of the system and instead hit hard at those who are tearing this country apart. This editorial is well written and gets right to the point without wasting words."

The editorial was written by the editor of the paper, Carmen J. Viglucci.

First place went to the Catholic Voice of Oakland for an editorial by its editor-in-chief, Father Richard A. Mangini, "America Is Losing Her Soul."

The Courier-Journal also was honored by the CPA in two other categories — best photo story, "Heartless Core of a Lonely City" and for best front page. The newspaper won the first prizes of the secular New York State Press Association in these categories.
