### Haitian Art Exhibit

Christ with Angels is one of several religion-inspired paintings on exhibit at Xerox Square in a collection assembled in the Republic of Haiti. The artist, Alberoi Bazile, depicted his subjects as neither black nor white, but all black haired and definitely florid of face. His angels, floating in a blue haze, wear fillets of lace and red flowers; the Saviour's robe and the foliage are tones of rosy red, and the middle ground is a stretch of flower-flecked grass. The oil-on-canvas painting, 24 by 30 inches, is one of the larger

pictures in a show that includes also wood sculpture and filigree panels made from oil drums. Amid scenes of street life and home life, farming and fishing are portraits of nature spirits, illustrations of bible stories and paintings of tribal religious ceremonies, laced with Christian symbolism. The show was obtained from Streetworkers, Inc., a New York social action organization. Its director is Manu Sassoonian, whose photographs of Haitian scenes also are on view at the gallery. The exhibition runs through June 30.


### VOCATIONS THEME
