Knights Meeting Supports Pontiff

Formal resolutions supporting Pope Paul VI, the Holy Year 1975 and several legislative issues were endorsed at the delegates' meeting of the New York Grand Commandery, Knights of St. John, May 3-5 at the 111 East Ave. Hotel.

In the first resolution the 30 official delegates at the meeting expressed "total loyalty and obedience to the Holy Father" and enumerated some of his accomplishments in his ten year reign. The Knights praised Pope Paul VI for his work with Second Vatican Council and synod of bishops and for his issuance of five important encyclicals.

The Knights pledged in their second resolution "to make every effort to follow the wishes of our bishops and make pilgrimages to our Cathedral during advance Holy Year 1974." The third resolution was forwarded to the New York State Catholic Committee and urged its support of issues concerning housing for the elderly, prisoner rehabilitation and employment, minimum living

standards for tenants, aid to the poor and a halt to pornography.

Bishop John E. McCafferty was re-elected spiritual advisor of the New York Grand Commandery. Donald Beluin was elected president and Joseph Copper was elected treasurer.

At the New York Grand Ladies Auxiliary meeting held at that time, Helen Bittner was elected president.

A memorial Mass was celebrated by Bishop McCafferty.

Cardinal Danielou Dies

Paris [RNS] — Cardinal Jean Danielou, Jesuit scholar and member of the prestigious French Academy, died of a heart attack here on May 20. He was 69. His death reduces the College of Cardinals to 131.

Cardinal Danielou, once widely regarded as one of the more "progressive" theologians in the Roman Catholic Church, became known in his later years as a staunch defender of papal authority and traditional Church structures.

After World War II, he was head of a group called "Christians of the Left" which opened dialogue with Marxists. A prominent ecumenist, he urged representatives at a 1966 conference of the World Fellowship

of Religion to promulgate a joint declaration condemning "all forms of religious intolerance."

Three years later, in an article in the Vatican City newspaper, L'Osservatore Romano, he insisted that Catholic bishops had the right to suppress "risky hypotheses" that would receive wide circulation.

"Legitimate authority," he wrote, "is the best guarantee of genuine freedom from partisan pressures." While defending the right of freedom in theological research, he warned that if the authority of the hierarchy were weakened, the Church would be at the mercy of small "tyrannical" groups.

Named to the College of Cardinals on April 28, 1969, Cardinal Danielou was one of the few priests so named without having served as a residential bishop.

Insisting that positions taken by some Catholic theologians "should be rectified," he singled out Swiss theologian Hans Kueng. "Father Kueng," he said, "does not represent the advanced and alive point of the authentic Church."

The French cardinal was one of the most prominent Catholic intellectuals to defend the encyclical ("Humanae Vitae") of Pope Paul that reaffirmed the Roman Catholic Church's ban on artificial contraception.
