To lesus, the Holy Spirit is the Spirit of truth. His chief work is to guide men to all truth. We have a special name for this bringing of God's truth to men. We call it revelation. Sunday's Cospel sets forth two basic principles of revelation.

First, revelation is given gradually, in proportion to man's capacity. When we wish to teach a lad algebra, we don't start with the binominal theorem. When we wish to teach geometry, we don't begin with solid geometry. We don't start with Homer's Odyssey or Cicero's Orations with beginners in Creek_or Latin.

God's revelation is like that God fits the revelation to the capacity of the learners. "I have much more to tell you, but you cannot bear it now" (R3) Thus we have a development of dogma in the Church: truths surfacing, not discernible before; as, for instance, the doctrine of indulgences.

The second principle of revelation set forth in Sunday's Gospel is that revelation is an ongoing process. "When he comes however, being the Spirit of truth he will guide you to all truth."

Divine revelation is whatever God reveals to man in a supernatural way. The old concept was that revelation was contained in propositional statements. Vatican II, however, laid the propositional theory of revelation to rest. In the Constitution on Divine Revelation, the Council said that divine revelation includes Jesus deeds, as well as His words. In fact the climax of divine revelation, it said, came with the events of Good Friday, Easter and Pentecost. (art. 4).

Thus divine revelation has two stages First, there is public revelation rooted in historical events, like the Exodus and the life of Jesus. This revelation was partially expressed in Scripture, the creeds and dogmas of the Church These events are basic to our faith, but not pivotal. They are the seeds, not the fruit. The fruit is faith.

But faith has to be as personal as one's birthday. Being personal,

It has to be the response of person to person like that between bride and groom Faith is me, believing in divine Persons Not just believing mind you, but believing in somebody. To believe somebody is to accept his veracity; to believe in somebody is to accept the person himself.

The only way we come to believe in somebody is to get to know him, not just his name and address, but him intimately, as a husband does his wife and a wife her husband.

For this reason, revelation cannot be just a past event. Revelation must be also something present, continuing to happen here and now to each of us personally. That is why we must be open to life and living to discover God, to experience the realities hidden behind the truths of our faith. Such insightful discoveries, such experiences we might well label personal or private revelation — the second stage

Our rest-onse to such revelation will not be something purely intells tual, an assent to truths long go hammered out into a creed ry believers (creedal faith), but a deep personal conviction that crupts into a life of faith) an act of **me believing** (personal faith)

Consider the doctrine of the Trinity You will find it in the Scripture Reading One speaks of God's eternal Word, Reading Two speaks of the Holy Spirit, Reading Three of the Father. To say I believe in the Trinity, that there are three Persons who are one God, is creedal faith But to say this, after having discovered the Wisdom of God, through suffering, the power of the Holy Spirit in prayer, and the Ioving concern of the Father in providing for us in a dire time of need is to experience the reality behind the truth of faith and to be able to have personal faith.


