Sixty of the nation's finest young football players, crossing the line from college stardom into the rookie professional ranks, were in Lubbock, Texas, for this summer's Kodak Coaches All America action.

Fifty nine of these 60 had been drafted by the pros. The established and strike-bound National Football League had the rights to 54 of these, while the new store had only six bodies under control.

Does that look to be an unbalanced situation?

The answer is yes and the reasons are connected with the coaching group that selected the team.

To begin with the coaches are establishment-minded, even though the NFL has discouraged rockies from playing in this annual charity game in past year.

If the WFL was slighted in the selection process, there was some reason behind the coaches thinking.

Because the WFL begins its championship season in July, its -training camps already were open. The coaches reasoned that the clubs would not permit their players to break camp for the All America show.

As it turned out, only seven WFL-players were invited, and six appeared, the seventh, Lucius Selman, having a valid excuse.

It seems the WFL was eager to send its few invitees, and did. The WFL appreciated the exposure on network, TV, Also, the WFL operators were eager to prove their willingness to cooperate with college coaches.

The NFL had a new look in its dealings in the West Texas football capital this time around.

Instead of resisting player invitations, the NFL encouraged them to play. Training for a couple of weeks in Texas is better, than no training camp, right?

Also, the 54 NFL rookies would be in one place where they could be reached with advice.

"advice" The from management was that the players frightened, not physically, but by the situation.

"The player reps said they would not condone any violence," said the 6-3, 236-pound super linebacker.

"But they said they couldn't guarantee control over the other players if we tried to enter camp and help the owners play their pre-season games. They said, again claiming they did not condone this, we might have to worry about reprisals later on once the strike is over, if we opposed them or helped the owners this summer.

"I hope the thing can be settled before our camps open in early July," said. Gradishar Otherwise I'm afraid the whole thing, including our careers, willgo up in smoke. To me and for some other rookies here, it is an


