Rome Is 'Mysterious' Pontiff Tells Pilgrims

Vatican City [RNS] — Pope Paul has urged visitors to Rome to get to know the "mystery" of the Eternal City.

Speaking from a window of the Apostolic Palace overlooking St. Peter's Square to the pilgrims and tourists gathered below for a customary Sunday noon address, the Pope extended a warm welcome to all visitors to Rome.

"We offer you our cordial welcome," he said, "which we hope will help you to understand how we, as Bishop of the Diocese of Rome, receive you as friends, as brothers, not as strangers."

The pontiff then said he did not intend to act as "a tour guide" to visitors to the city, but would like to offer a "suggestion" which, he said, he did not think was superfluous: "An intelligent traveler, in order to know and enjoy Rome, must discover it."

"Not," he explained, "that Rome's monuments are hidden; in fact they immediately arouse the interest and admiration of every visitor — those of ancient Rome, of Christian Rome, and of modern Rome. But with regard to the past which concerns us, Rome is not only history, not only art, not only a type of civilization — Rome is mystery."

Rome is mysterious because of the transcendent destiny of

mankind has its key, its secret, in the Eternal City, which guards the tombs of the Apostles Peter and Paul. . . . In Rome, the formula of unity and catholicity is attested to silently, but clearly, in the ancient-but-ever-new, divine-human institution in the service of the world that is the Catholic Church.

"In Rome the voices of the centuries, if we but listen to them carefully, will speak to us about faith, love, and peace . . ."

Pope Paul exhorted visitors to Rome "to look, to see, and to understand" for "then, one's stay in the city, however short, will be a prophetic and happy moment."

DOME RAILING TO BE REPLACED

Vatican City [RNS] — The iron railing that for more than three centuries has surrounded the balcony outside the top-most dome of St. Peter's Basilica is being replaced.

Vatican officials said the replacement was decided upon after a four-year-old girl managed to squeeze through a gap in the railing and plunged 150 feet to her death.

The accident on June 29 was the first of its kind in the memory of Vatican officials.
