

# Eddie's: The Restaurant Of Lendgandary Dining

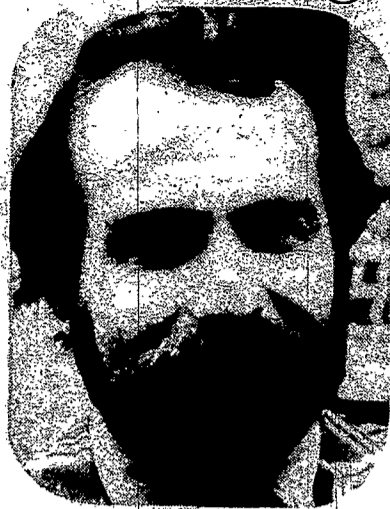

The great heart of downtown Rochester's lunch hour is the 51-year-old Eddie's Chop House, gathering place, bargaining place, politicking place, drinking place, and above all dining place for hundreds of the City's professionals and laymen.

And the moment one steps inside Eddie's doors, it's easy to see why.

Cordiality, service, atmosphere and terrific chow have all contributed to making this history-laden restaurant a favorite.

The folks at Eddie's like to say that radio had barely outgrown the crystal set and it was the heyday of Jack Dempsey, Will Rogers and Eddie Cantor when

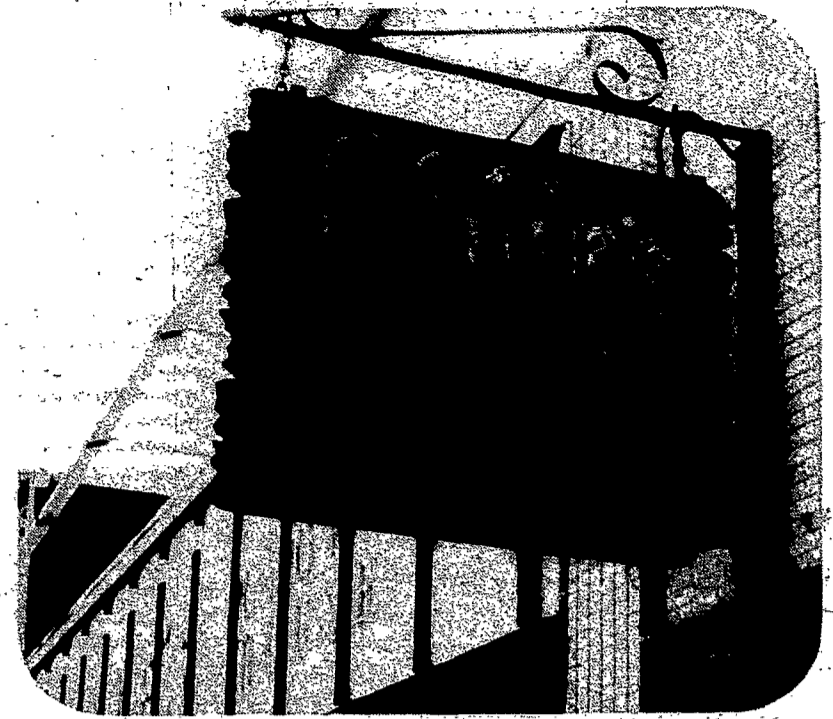

The times have changed, of course, and the management of the place, but, if it seems possible, they've all been changes for the better. James Giancola and Don Burruto now run the spacious eatery at 367 East Main St.

Last Thursday's lunch crowd was a congenial group, the babble of its voices subdued in the warm Old English decor, couples, businessmen, a whole table of the best bartenders in the City, young and old.

Our waitress, Karen, who also attends the U of R and plans to study medicine, served a very enjoyable meal, beginning with ample preprandials of Jack Daniel's. She was careful to allow adequate time for the Tennessee
