

# Junta Scored by WCC

Geneva [RNS] — "Gross violations" of human rights are continuing to take place in Chile, the Commission of the Churches on International Affairs (CCIA) charged here.

The executive committee of the World Council of Churches agency urged Churches to do everything in their power to assure the restoration of the rule of law in the Latin American nation.

"Even as we meet" the CCIA statement said, "military courts (in Chile) have condemned several prisoners to death."

There are at least 6,000 political prisoners in Chile, according to the CCIA, which termed a new wave of arrests "alarming." Foreign intervention, especially by Brazil, was held to be a contributing factor to repression in Chile.

### RELIEF CARGO LOST

New York [RNS] — A \$300,000 shipment of emergency relief supplies intended for Cambodian refugees was destroyed Aug. 8 when the cargo ship was sunk in Phnom Penh harbor by a guerrilla rocket attack, Catholic Relief Services reported.

The CRS shipment of dry milk, antiseptic soap, blankets, used clothing, vitamins, antibiotics, malaria drugs and hospital equipment was part of a "high priority" relief program that benefits more than 235,000 homeless victims of war. Also aboard the lost vessel were 100 block presses to be used in the making of bricks, hand tools, such as shovels and hammers, nails and other building materials.

Allende Gossens last year has long been a target of criticism by the World Council.

Chile is now governed by Gen. Augusto Pinochet Ugarte, one of four officers who engineered the coup d'etat.

The CCIA committee urged Christians to pray for the people of Chile and to appeal to their governments to prevent further "grave consequences" of the Chilean situation.

In another statement, the agency voiced anxiety over the recent coup in Cyprus. It welcomed the Geneva agreement on a cease fire and hoped that Cypriots would be involved in the second stage of peace negotiations.

A major topic of discussion at the CCIA meeting was "the economic threat to peace." In a memorandum to the World Council's policy-making Central Committee, the CCIA said "the very future of international society" is threatened by a combination of problems, including oil crisis, food shortage and monetary troubles.

Another problem, the memorandum said, is that the international economic system is unjust. It said special United Nations General Assembly sessions had clearly demonstrated the demand for a "new international economic order."

On development in poor nations, the memorandum said that over-development is no more needed than under-development. "Whenever waste of food, energy and natural resources occur, a consequence of over-consumption, it should be condemned," the CCIA said.

Declaring that there will be no economic order if a will for change is lacking, the memorandum appealed to Christians and their Churches to publicize economic problems. The CCIA warned that unless action is taken quickly, the world is on the road to catastrophe.

A working paper on disarmament also examined the impact of unjust social and economic structures. The CCIA committee said efforts to achieve disarmament are not as strong as they once were.

The paper urged Churches, as a matter of duty, to express firm opposition "to the suicidal arms race." Investigation of the mounting trade in conventional arms was also urged.

Draft statements condemning "repressive" regimes in South Korea and the Philippines were sent to the WCC Central Committee for consideration.
