Recently 1 picked up a hitchiker at the edge of Webster. He was about 25, with curly hair which was not particularly long, but he seemed to think it daring. His car was in a nearby garage for repairs, and he was on his way there. The dialogue follows.

Priest: Hop in, friend.

Hitchhiker: Thank you. This is the first hitchhiking I've done since college days. Some people are turned off by long hair. But I guess people are more liberal today.

**P:** Isn't it curious that so many priests and Sisters who involve themselves in activism end up in marriage, despite their original commitment to God and the Church. What parish do you belong to?

## **PARISH COUNCIL**

Wayland - St. Joseph's Parish-Council Formation Committee has finished its work and the provisional constitution has been written. The nominating committee is in the process of drawing up a list of nominees which will be submitted to the people of the parish for voting and election. Waterloo — Revitalization is the key word at St. Mary's elementary school. When classes resume Sept. 4, St. Mary's will have a new kindergarten and a reinstated the seventh grade.

A new pre-school program for three and four-year-olds, staffed by school personnel is open to the entire community enrollment.

The seventh and eighth grades had been discontinued because of financial problems, declining enrollment and an apparent loss of enthusiasm for Catholic education. The seventh grade will open for the 1974-75 school year, and the eighth grade is slated for re-instatement by September 1975 as the parish community responds to the challenge of strengthening the school as the hub of the parish.




