Cardinal Cooke III

New York (RNS) — Cardinal Terence Cooke of New York is suffering from a serious form of malaria contracted during a six-day tour of the drought-stricken sub-Saharan region of Africa. But his physician reported that the Roman Catholic prelate is responding well to treatment.

The cardinal was forced to cancel all his activities, including a press conference concerning relief efforts in Africa and a planned meeting with President Ford in Washington, D.C.

Upon returning to the U.S. on Oct. 4, Cardinal Cooke complained of feeling ill and his physician, Dr. Kevin Cahill, diagnosed the condition as a serious form of malaria known as faciparum.

"Fortunately, it was diagnosed early and the cardinal is responding well," said the physician. He predicted that

Cardinal Cooke would need at least a week to recuperate.

There were no plans to hospitalize the cardinal but his planned statements and the showing of videotaped highlights of his African trip regarding famine, drought and subsequent relief efforts have been indefinitely postponed.

Cardinal Cooke went to West Central Africa on a fact-finding mission to determine the extent of the needs of the people in the area that includes Mauritania, Senegal, Mali, Upper Volta, Niger, Nigeria, Chad and parts of the Sudan, Ethiopia and Kenya.

The prelate's journey took him to Dakar in Senegal and to Nouakchott in Mauritania and to the desert areas outside Touba in Senegal. He is expected extensively on the need to extend this nation's aid programs to Africa and to other underdeveloped areas of the world.

UFW Group Issues Statement

The beginning of the harvest season was marked by a statement of support of American farm workers read at a news conference Saturday, Oct. 12. The statement, made by the United Farmworkers Support Committee, is endorsed by labor, church and community leaders, many of whom attended the ceremonies in front of the House of Bacchus, 1000 E. Ridge Rd., a retail liquor store.

Members of the UFW have been unsuccessful in their attempts to establish negotiations with the House of Bacchus over the sale of Gallo wine products. The UFW is waging a boycott of western iceberg lettuce, California table grapes and Gallo wine in an effort to secure free elections for farm workers. The Teamsters Union has control of

the contracts for the farm workers in these three areas.

The statement reads:

"As harvest time approaches, we remember with gratitude the men, women, and children who help put food on our table and yet often barely have been able to satisfy their own hunger and thirst — that is, the farm workers who have been denied secret ballots to select a union of their choice.

We support the boycott of Gallo conducted by the UFW-AFL-CIO. We urge local businesses including the House of Bacchus to practice ethical merchandising by taking Gallo wine off the shelf."

CRS Sends 3,750 Tons To Honduras

New York (RNS) — Catholic Relief Services, the overseas aid agency of the U.S. Catholic Conference, has transported some 3,750 tons of relief materials valued at \$1,750,000 for emergency aid to hurricane victims in Honduras.

The most recent aid was a 35 tons cargo valued at \$69,175, sent with a special Boeing 707 charter to San Pedro Sula, the heart of the disaster area. Contributions from Caritas/Germany assisted with the air charter and supplies.

The cargo, the second sent by CRS since the tropical storm hit Honduras Sept. 20, included drugs, equipment and foodstuffs suitable for mass feeding.

Included in the shipment was 10,000 doses of typhoid vaccine, 13,000 disposable syringes and needles, 2,400 new cotton blankets, 11 drums of high potency vitamins, four tons of tools, two jeeps and 100 disaster worker kits, and 20 tons of rice and other foods.
