



Three for Christmas

The U.S. Postal Service will issue three stamps, including an experimental self-stick precanceled, for Christmas 1974. They will go on sale Oct. 24 at post offices throughout the country.

The three stamps, all in 10c denominations, are from left:

A dove of peace

weather vane from Mount Vernon, George Washington's home in Virginia, adorns the self-stick precanceled stamp. The weather vane was made in 1787 by Joseph Rakestraw of Philadelphia according to Washington's specifications. Washington is said to have chosen the dove design because he was weary of war and longed for a symbol of

peace. The stamp, which bears the words "Peace on Earth" and "Christmas" was designed by Don Hedin and Robert Geissman of New York. Since it is a precanceled, the Postal Service expects it to considerably shorten mail processing time.

A detail from "The Perussis Altarpiece," a large oil painting in New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art, has been used for the annual religious masterpiece stamp. Designed by Bradbury Thompson of Riverside, Conn., the stamp is dominated by an angel, in a robe of rich red hue, taken from the center of the five panels making up the altarpiece. The identity of the artist who painted the altarpiece is unknown although it is known to have been done in 1480.

The third Christmas stamp is taken from a popular Currier and Ives lithographic print of 1853, "The Road — Winter." The stamp, designed by Steven Dohanos of Westport, Conn., shows a man and a woman in a horse-drawn red and gold sleigh moving through a winter landscape. [RNS]
