Born in Brooklyn, Hugh Carey went to St. John's College, until World War II intervened. He enlisted as a private, and after seeing combat with the 104th division in France, Belgium, Holland, and Germany was discharged as a colonel. He received the Bronze Star, Croix de Guerre with Silver Star, and the Combat Infantry Award.

Carey returned to college, and received a Doctor of Jurisprudence from St. John's Law School in 1951. He pursued a career in business and law, until in 1960 he won a Congressional seat in one of the most Republican districts in New York City. Despite gerrymandering efforts in 1962, he won again, and Carey has been re-elected consistently, and by wide margins.

Carey and his late wife, Helen, were the parents of 14 children, 2 of whom died in 1969.

Working for What We Need.

His work in Congress, including membership on the Education and Labor and the Ways and Means committees, has been extraordinary. It has included authorship of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, the revenue-sharing bill, Operation Headstart program, and more bills to help the education of the handicapped than any other member.

When you look around the state, you can see what Carey's helped to do. It was Carey's revenue-sharing bill that in 1972 gave New York almost \$600,000,000.00 to help keep taxes down. Hugh Carey was the key voice in Congress to get some of your federal tax dollars back home, into your schools. And his compassion brought the most important federal help that's ever been given to the handicapped, like the National Technical Institute for the Deaf in Rochester, and special educational programs to the physically and mentally handicapped.

Carey Promises Legislation Lessening Abortions

If elected Governor, I will support legislation and programs that will provide a positive alternative to abortion and will assure that the necessary services and opportunities are available to women who wish to avoid abortion.

I will ask the Legislature to renew the maternal and child health centers in order to reach out and assist with problems related to pregnancies and to provide a means of helping to solve such problems as venereal disease and child abuse. I fought for such programs when they were funded by the Federal Government and fought to prevent their destruction by the Nixon Administration. The Nixon Administration succeeded in closing out those funds and it's up to the State to take up the slack and under my administration it will.

These centers will also serve as referral centers for child adoption agencies and for services to the handicapped. Troubled women considering an abortion will know that there are couples ready to adopt and love their child. We will increase and publicize the services available to handicapped people.

I will also support programs, to provide grants and aids to persons adopting children with physical and mental handicaps.

In this manner, we will assure that women have a free choice and that they are not forced into an abortion because they feel there is no other solution.

Personally, of course, I am opposed to abortion but as a public official, as my opponent has stated he would, I must recognize the law of the land as enunciated by the Supreme Court.

However, I believe in offering meaningful alternatives to people so that they can continue to live up to their moral principles. I have outlined what I believe are meaningful alternatives. A discharge petition for a constitutional amendment is not a meaningful alternative. In my 14 years in Congress, a discharge petition has never succeeded in producing a law. Since the procedure was adopted in 1910, 850 petitions have been filed but only two became law, both of which had overwhelming support. As you know, such support has not developed for any abortion amendment. Right to life groups are unable to agree on the wording of any such amendment.

I believe that programs such as I have outlined above are much more effective. I plan to act as Governor as I have always tried to act as a Congressman, that is, to create and support programs which enrich the value of human life.
