



KICKING UP — McQuaid Jesuit's Chuck Schott put his name in both the Monroe County, Section 5 and N.Y. State football record books with his recent 46-yard field goal against Bishop Kearney. The boot beat former McQuaid kicking great Bob Thomas' 45-yard boot back in 1969. Thomas, of course, went on to star for Notre Dame and had tryouts with several pro teams this fall. Schott's kick puts him among the top half-dozen kickers in N.Y. State schoolboy grid history.

UNSUNG HEROES — Madison head football coach Don Lander says McQuaid doesn't do anything fancy, they just keep coming at you. Bishop Kearney head coach Don Della Vella says McQuaid doesn't have the talent it had last year, it doesn't have any stars, but the Knights do have

Named honorable mention were goalies Vic Frank (Aquinas), goalie Kevin Ryan (McQuaid), fullbacks Dan Leonhard (Kearney), Jim Fredericks (Mooney), Mike Nietopski (Mooney), Joe Mesko (McQuaid), Steve Lukas (Aquinas), and Mike Battisti (Aquinas); halfbacks Emmett Fox (Aquinas), Luis Sanchez (McQuaid), Paul Moriarity (Mooney), Brian Dugan (Mooney), Vince Tersegno (Kearney); and forwards Jim Dellaville and John Doyle (Kearney), Jim Eichas (Mooney), Charlie Lawless (McQuaid) and Joe Dileberto (Aquinas).

WINNING DOESN'T COUNT — Notre Dame of Utica head basketball coach Ed Klein compiled a 168-36 record in ten years of coaching, but won't be around this season. Klein, whose teams won 43 in a row at one point, was let go by ND officials as part of an austerity program which hopefully will stabilize the financial situation at ND.

SECOND CHOICE — Greece Arcadia, unbeaten Section 5 cross country Class A champion considered by many area coaches as one of the best high school teams in the East, was not WROC-TV (Channel 8)'s first choice in a brief film bit last week. Don Fishcher went to Pittsford where he did an interview with Sutherland High's runners, the Class B champion. Fishcher noted Sutherland won 19 and lost two, but didn't mention the two losses were to Arcadia.

GOOD FOOT — Jim Avenius, a Webster Thomas grad, played his heart out in his final game as a senior for St. John Fisher's varsity soccer team. Avenius assisted on one goal by teammate Steve Gagnier of Pittsford, scored a goal himself in the second half on an assist from Gagnier, and assisted on a third Cardinal goal by Sam Costanza of Penfield later in the second half. The game, against Niagara, ended in a 3-3 tie. Avenius, All-State as a freshman at Fisher, led the Cardinals in scoring along with Gagnier. Both had 12 points.

Dr. James T. Cusick

Hammondsport — Dr. James T. Cusick, a research chemist who developed canning methods that have been used for half a century, died Nov. 1, 1974, in Davenport Hospital, Bath. He was 91 years old, but had been in good health until recently.

The funeral was held at St. Gabriel's Nov. 4.

Dr. Cusick worked for 18 years as a chemist in Brockport canneries before coming here in 1939 as a consultant to local wineries.

He also worked in Geneva, at Cornell University's agricultural experiment station. He was a 1907 graduate of Colgate University and held a master's degree from Yale and a Ph.D. from Cornell.

He is survived by his wife, Elizabeth; three daughters, Mrs. E. McMahon, New York city; Mrs. Frederick Brister, Arlington, Va.; and Mrs. R. Lee Thomas, Bettendorf, Iowa and seven grandchildren.

Lucy Weber

Lucy F. Weber of Warner Street, who lived to know 20 great-great grandchildren, died Oct. 25, 1974, after a brief illness. She was in her 94th year.

Mrs. Weber, mother of 12, had 95 direct descendants in four generations. Ninety-two of them are living. Her husband, Frank, a farmer, died in 1939.

One grandson is Trappist Brother Anthony of Our Lady of the Genesee Abbey in Piffard. He gave the homily and served the funeral Mass Oct. 28 in Holy Apostles Church.
