# Pontiff Offers Courage To CELAM Bishops

Vatican City [RNS] — Pope Paul urged Roman Catholic bishops of Latin America to pursue "renewed apostolic" activities without being intimidated by the "insensitivity" of some Christians "in the face of social injustice" or by the "sometimes deep-seated divisions" within the ecclesial community.

The Pope also warned the representatives of the Latin American Bishops' Conference (CELAM) at the close of their 15th assembly, that they should also be on guard against a "two-fold temptation" of some people — to "integrate themselves in ideologies which are alien to the

Christian spirit," or to have recourse "to violence which brings, in its wake evils that are much worse than those they wish to remedy."

The pontiff spoke at a Mass he concelebrated with 50 CELAM bishops in the Vatican's Sistine Chapel on Nov. 3.

The organization that represents 22 Latin American national bishops' conferences had met in Rome for its annual assembly, shortly after the close of the recent world Synod of Bishops at the Vatican.

Pope Paul, in a homily, reminded the Latin American

prelates that a large majority of the continent's population were "young people."

"Young people," he said, "are not only the men and women of tomorrow, but the Christians of today, who, with their intuitions, their strength, and their joy, and with a healthy spirit of criticism open to hope, constitute a ferment in today's society."

"These young people," the Pope added, "hope they will be shown the living reality of the Kingdom of Christ, with its calls to justice, love, and peace — and not the Utopia of a world which they will never know."

Later, addressing the faithful gathered in St. Peter's square, Pope Paul referred to the "pastoral effort" that is being undertaken in Latin America, and urged his listeners to be "spiritual participants" in the effort.

"Perhaps you already know or can imagine the grave, urgent, and immense moral and social problems of that continent, which under certain aspects are not dissimilar from those of other nations, including our own (Italy)," the Pope said.

"However," he insisted, "they are problems which do not frighten, but stimulate the charity of evangelization. This means understanding what economic and social changes must be fostered especially in countries of the Third World, in order to achieve a better adjustment to the needs and rights of modern civilization and of human dignity."

# Vatican Withdraws Reporter's Credentials

Vatican City [RNS] — The Vatican press office announced it had withdrawn its accreditation from a reporter of the Rome Communist newspaper Paese Sera.

The reporter, Lillo Spadini, the paper's "Vaticanista" (Vatican expert) for ten years, frequently illustrates his articles with cartoon-like sketches.

On Oct. 26, the day of the closing of the month-long world Synod of Bishops at the Vatican, Paese Sera published a roundup of the assembly's discussions that featured six satirical cartoons by Spadini.

One of the cartoons depicted a black African bishop chasing a

fat, elderly white bishop, and calling out, "Don't be frightened. I only want to make sure that you go away and never come back."

The sketch was captioned, "Indigenization." In the course of the Synod deliberations on "Evangelization in the Modern World," a number of African prelates had called for indigenization, or the adapting of expressions of Catholic faith and worship to local cultures.

Another cartoon showed a robed cardinal sitting on a street corner with a begging bowl in hand, saying, "The poor face of the Church. Give charity to a poor cardinal."
