Gallo Picketing Restrictions Eased

The temporary restraining order issued against members of the United Farm Workers Support Committee concerning the picketing of the House of Bacchus, 1000 E. Ridge Rd., Irondequoit, was revised last Thursday by State Supreme Court Justice Joseph Fritsch.

The revised injunction allows the committee to distribute leaflets within 10 feet of any store in Georgetown Plaza, where the liquor store is located, provided that no more than three committee members are involved.

The original order, issued Nov. 2, prevented the group from conducting activities within 100 feet of the store. The injunction was sought by Jerry Clifford, store owner, and Albert Monnile, landlord of the plaza. The committee protested the injunction on the grounds that it violated their right of free speech.

Lawyers representing the plaza intend to file a brief explaining the reasons for the injunction.

The committee which advocated the boycott of Gallo wine products has been picketing the store, handing out leaflets, talking to customers and conducting prayer services for five weeks.

The United Farmworkers Union, AFL-CIO, has urged the boycott of all non-UFW table

grapes, head lettuce and Gallo wine until farm workers can obtain a secret ballot union election. The controversy stems from the Gallo Company's refusal, in 1973, to renew the UFW contract after six years with that union. The company is currently under contract with the Teamsters Union. Approximately 92 per cent of the workers went on strike, demanding free elections of union representatives.

"The store promotes Gallo by having prominent displays advertising Gallo in strategic parts of the store. These displays jump out at the customer and increase the sale of the wine," said Sue Dollinger, spokesman for the committee. "All we're asking is for the store to take the displays down and reduce the visibility of Gallo on their shelves. Other liquor stores have complied with this demand."

According to Ms. Dollinger, the group received the injunction following a prayer service in front of the store Halloween night. Cesar Chavez, president of UFW, sent the committee a telegram expressing his gratitude for their support. He said that victory was within the workers' grasp and urged the group to remain tight in their boycott efforts.

"In no way do we intend to give up on this quiet and beautiful issue for social justice," Ms. Dollinger said.

Warm Rome Welcome Expected by Charismatic

St. Paul, Minn. [RNS] — Roman Catholic charismatics will receive "a very warm welcome" when they go to Rome in May for their 1975 international conference, a leader of the Catholic charismatic renewal movement predicted here.

Kevin Ranaghan of South Bend, Ind., recently in Rome to prepare for the meeting, said the conference probably will be housed

in a large tent to be erected over the catacombs of St. Callistus.

Scheduled over Pentecost weekend, May 16-19, the conference will mark the first large-scale gathering of Catholic charismatics in the world center of Catholicism. It will be one of the events of the Church's Holy Year.

Ranaghan said plans are being

made for a conference of 10,000 persons. Registrations from North America will have to be limited to 4,000 persons, he said, adding that "many more want to go."

Program for the conference has not yet been set but Ranaghan said a number of cardinals and bishops will be involved in it, including Cardinal Leo Suenens of Belgium who is active in charismatic renewal.
