I have not seen many of the Christmas specials this year primarily because a check of the listings show that too many of the so called "classics" are being run for the umpteenth time.

I did sit down and watch two shows with the kids however, one of them as charming and delightful as the other was atrocious.

The first "The House Without A Christmas Tree" was first shown three years ago. It is proof that a piece thoughtfully conceived and beautifully executed can go on year after year without producing a kind of seasonal gangrene in the viewer. On the other hand I am probably unduly swayed by the art of Miss Mildred Natwick who plays the grandmother with such credibility that I find it nearly impossible to divorce her from her own characterization of the warm and wise provincial.

There also is a good lesson in ... restraint in this show. What the is handled delicately and the audience never feels endangered by excessive doses of affection.

On the whole the story set in the Forties is an excellent reminder of Christmas in a more simple era, a story that can bear repeating on a yearly-basis.

In contrast the Bing Crosby Family Special would have done better not to have illuminated the small screen once.

It seems clear enough that the only excuse for this hour-longprogram sponsored by the Bell System was to give Bing a showcase for his annual rendition of "White Christmas."

What came before in the way of additional divertissement was enough to jade even the most insatiable viewer of Christmas shows.

With special guests Karen Valentine and singer Mac. Davis plus Bing's wife and children, the writers had the affrontery to mess up some Christmas stories by O. Henry and Christopher Morley.

On top of this the transitional dialogue that took Bing from song to song was of the nature that we have been made accustomed to by other variety shows.

Only redeeming feature was the drawing room setting a large, gracious paneled room which was enough to cause envy among those of us trying to figure which piece of furniture can best go to make room for the tree.

Mooney Students Active In Community Service

The Action for People Association (AFPA) of Cardinal Mooney High School has taken steps to meet the hunger crisis. One program consists of a week every month when students contribute to a daily milk fund to aid the starving. This money is given directly to missionary personnel of the Brothers of Holy Cross, and Sisters of Mercy who administer food programs in Bangladesh and Chile.

Another plan initiated by Sister Lisette O'Brien and Mrs. Pat Sansone, is the educating of students to the plight of the world's poor. Students are shown that Americans have to reevaluate their mode of living because it affects the rest of the world.

This awareness was brought to student attention during the Dec. 12 fast day at school. Only soup, bread, and milk, at a cost of 25 cents, were served instead of the usual full hot lunch. Students were encouraged to donate their unspent lunch money to the poor.

According to school officials, reaction ranged from enthusiasm to anger. Student irritation resulted from having the money to spend, but it would only buy soup and bread.

Brother Thomas Mulryan, AFPA moderator, found this to be a helpful educational experience. "The poor and hungry are often angry at their plight," he said, "and we had a chance to share both their hunger and their anger."
