Geneva | The words were unhappy.

"It is my obligation and sad duty to announce to you, the students of DeSales High School, that DeSales will not reopen next September and that we must close our doors and the history of our school at the completion of this school year."

The words were spoken by Martin Eades, chairman of the board of trustees of DeSales at a student-faculty assembly, Monday morning, Jan. 20.

Reasons were given: a necessary tuition rise from \$350 to \$500 for next year caused a decline in enrollment; lack of financial aid; not enough manpower to undertake the massive fund-raising program necessary to meet the rising expenses.

Still, students were hurt. Jim Cardinale, senior class president, said, "This a bad blow to the spirit of the city of Geneva. It makes me feel like there's a death in the

tamily."

A junior, Mark McDonald, said, "It's going to be too late when everybody realizes what a mistake it is (the closing). I wish there was a way to keep it open."

Mary Beth Walsh, a sophomore; said, "It's really sad because I had two good years here and I was looking for two more DeSales has something special that no other school has."

May Polce, a junior, saw wider import in the closing. "Letting the only Catholic high school in General close down says a lot about our society which doesn't say much at all."

A junior, **Bob Rice**, sees some glimmer of hope. "One good point about closing is that it will unify the city. Too bad it had to close but it was evident it would happen."

John Buckley, a junior, said, "It's really strange... I'm used to our small school community and don't think I"ll mingle too much across the street (Geneva High). I think the city could have

kept the school open, but it's too late now."

Needless to say, faculty were as upset as students but Sister Agnes Catherine, the principal, advised all "to have courage and work to make this the best five months that DeSales has ever had."
