Ithaca Immaculate Notes School Week

exemplifies Immaculate Conception School of Ithaca this week. Celebrating the Second Annual Catholic School Week, Feb. 2-8, the students, teachers, administrators and parents have been and are working very hard to make the week real and meaningful. Father John Maloney, pastor, gave the homily at all last Sunday's Masses speaking on the Catholic Schools Week theme — "Different Where It Counts: Message, Community, Service,"

The school has 264 pupils this year, comprising grades K through 8. It employs 12 full-time teachers and 2 part-time, and one full-time, secretary. There are seven volunteer teachers, plus 25 additional volunteer helpers. The Scott, Foresman Reading systems are used for Grades 1 through 4, with cross grade reading groups for Grades 4 through 8, allowing students to progress at their own individual groups are also used for Grades 3 through 8.

Immaculate boasts a fine music program taking advantage of the Ithaca College Music Education department and its student teaching programs. Physical Education is held twice weekly for all grades. The school also employs a part-time psychologist, speech teacher, nurse teacher, support teacher and aides and utilizes a wellequipped Library-Learning Center, the latter playing an important role in the Math and Reading groups.

There are two kindergarten sessions this year, one morning and one afternoon. Transportation to the school is available on request through Ithaca, Lansing Newfield, Trumansburg and Dryden school districts. Tuition amount is set

according to number of children in the family and parishioner/non-arishioner status. There is a funcioning School Board and Home and School Association.

On Monday there was Open House at the school and a patriotic program in the gym, "200 Years of U.S. History in Skits and Songs," put on by the children. Special guests were the senior citizens of Ithaca, the fourth graders having sent written invitations to them to come. Special hosts serving refreshments were the sixth graders.

On Tuesday, prospective kindergarten children and parents were invited to visit school in session. Third graders worked on a service project, valentine favors for the local Nursing Home residents.

Wednesday is 'School Family Day' where the entire school — students, teachers, parents and especially grandparents will have the opportunity to pray and eat together as a "family." Mass at 6 p.m. in the church will be followed by a lasagna dinner in the school gym.

On Thursday the patriotic theme will focus on local government when the sixth graders visit Ithaca Mayor Conley's office, who also has issued a proclamation announcing Ithaca's Catholic School Week.

On Friday at 1 p.m. there will be the closing celebration, a prayer service in the gym, rededicating the goals of Catholic education. There will be a slide presentation of "The School Family Album" showing typical everyday school activities, programs and regular school classes. Parents are welcome to attend.
