Nevertheless, Aquinas has two star performers, Terry Ryan and Andy Fornarola, in the City-Catholic League. Aquinas has not lost a backstroke event in four years. This year is no different with senior co-captain Ryan swimming for the maroon and white. He hasn't lost a backstroke event or any other event this year, according to Irishcoach Terry Pelcher, Farnarolá,

the other Irish co-captain, is the only diver in the City-Catholic League this year to break the 200point barrier.
