Well the Hickok Belt now is given away at a free promotional sales luncheon in Chicago and New York, and the Press-Radio Club of Rochester's once automatically successful charity promotion is, let's face it, floundering

Lincoln-Mercury arrived on the scene two years ago and sold a luxury car to the club for about half price, to wind up in possession of Washington Redskin running back Larry Brown. This replaced the Belt.

That was a brief, not so happy marriage, and the P-R Club needed a new sponsor. People poked around at prospects of luring Kodak or Coca Cola, but these attempts did not click.

The Italian-American Civil Rights League came out of nowhere with the most generous deal in the club's history. Asking for nothing, the league handed out \$2,500 toward the club's children's charities. And got largely ignored.

Gannett got into the act a year ago, giving up \$5,000 for the charity fund, and taking over promotion of local balloting for athlete of the year. This time around, the Gannett people got very involved in recruiting head table personnel; and learned some tough facts of life.

Jock banquet talent comes mighty high. Gannett last year authorized expenditure of \$2,700 for some Miami Dolphin talent, to beef up the head table. That came out of dinner revenue, and seriously cut into the bottom line.

Sports stars are even more expensive, despite recession. It became customary in the last 10 years to make package deals, bringing athletes into Rochester, then shipping them on to Jamestown and Erie, in package deals that helped fill the Rochester dais. At bargain prices. That's history.

A \$35 ticket is not easy to sell.

Monroe Baptists Urge Dismissal Of Attica Cases

The Monroe Association of American Baptist Churche's called last week for the dismissal of all indictments that came out of the Attica uprising of 1971. They also asked the state to release funds appropriated for payment of defendants' legal expenses.

In a resolution taken at the association's 148th annual meeting, delegates said they assumed, as citizens, a share in the responsibility for the violence at Attica and declared that "there is no way through judicial proceedings to serve justice after the months and years of accumulated injustices persons accused of crimes have endured."

The resolution asked individual congregations to study the moral aspects of the situation and endorse the appeal to the governor and attorney general.


