From a Bishop's Secretary:

I do want you to know that I have read your column regularly for the past few years, and find it a source of interest and information. Although I rarely know anyone that you write about in your column, nevertheless I find it very interesting. This letter is to thank you for a few moments interesting reading each week. God bless your efforts in spreading the Good News.

To a Bishop's Secretary:

Thank you for your kind letter. The Lord knows that stability in the Church is what the Church needs; and that is my constant gospel. Too many people are seasick from the rocking of the Bark of Peter.

Our diocese had a Dr. Arkin as the speaker for our recent clergy conference. Our priests are enthusiastic about his presentation, which was orthodox presented in the style of Jack Benny. His humor gave a wonderful tone to a serious and marvelous subject, viz. The Priesthood. An interesting note. Dr. Arkin, about 50 years old, not only is a layman but he is the head of the Theology Department of the Jesuit University of St. Louis. He was a clergyman for three years before his conversion to the Catholic Faith through Bishop Sheen.

Father William Gall of our diocesan communications department is reproducing the talks in cassette tapes. I will send you a set. Maybe you will be God's instrument in the evangelization of the clergy of your own diocese. You will love the humor. You will admire the scholarship. But best of all, you will be edified by the presentation of the Holy Priesthood.

To Sister Virginia Hogan, SSJ.

I do not know just to whom this note should go, but I am impelled to tell somebody how delighted I was at the Catholic Church Choirs Concert in Rochester. Since you were the Director, may I address my thanks through you?

To see and to hear members from 20 Catholic Choirs of the diocese, 180 strong, including several of our fine Sisters, with their own ensemble, singing quality religious music to a full house at Annunciation was a thrill. And it was fitting that the prelude was made by our liturgical pioneer, and great musician, Father Benedict Ehmann. I met him at Father Leo Jones' funeral today, and asked him how the affair came about. He said that members from 20 choirs had their individual practices in their individual parishes, working up to five rehearsals of the 180 members at St. Agnes School. Well, the results were exhilarating. We left the church blessing God for a gladsome renewal of sacred music.

I have anguished over some of the tawdry stuff intruded into the Divine Worship these past few years; and have been strongly tempted, and not completely overcoming the temptation, to hope that those who have selected the hymns for the missalettes will spend time in Purgatory even more for their omissions than for their inclusions.

Yet in all fairness, I know there is a lot of good music in the diocese, and that it is often in unexpected places. For example, recently I had the Sunday Masses in Port Byron and Shortsville. They are both small parishes. Port Byron has two choirs, and both of them are very good, not only in voice but in the selection of the sacred music. Shortsville has a small but capable traditional choir and an exceptionally good folk group, which played and sang softly and beautifully and selected hymns which were genuinely spiritual. Another Sunday I was at Macedon, where the organist led the congregational singing competently, and the folk group was devotional. Now with the impetus that your 20 choirs are giving, things are looking up. But I am still strongly tempted to hope for Purgatorial justice for the Missalette people. Will you thank the choristers, and express our hope that the Sunday concert is just a beginning, and more will follow?
