DSC Studying Convent Closings

The Diocesan Sisters' Council voted to consult their constituents at the grassroots level before the Ad Hoc Committee on the Closing of Convents begins to formulate a report.

During the Feb. 8 meeting at Mercy Motherhouse, the Sisters agreed to contact the Pastoral Center, which is conducting a corollary report on convent closing. The report of the Sisters of St. Joseph Senate meeting concerning the procedure of closing convents was also accepted by the DSC.

According to the delegates, some convents are closed without prior consultation with the Sisters involved. The committee would investigate the reasons determining the closing of a convent and try to insure that the Sisters are made a part of the decision making process regarding convent life.

Sister Edwina Butler delivered the report of the By-Law Revision Committee. Among the amendments suggested was the clarification of whether the president should officiate as chairperson or if the two duties should remain distinct and be given to two separate individuals. The Committee also questioned the vice president's sole responsibilities concerning

publicity and said that the duties of the parliamentarian, Sister Augustine Malley RSM, should be specified.

During the meeting in which Sister Alice McLaughlin SSJ presided as president, the DSC voted that it could take the responsibility of making statements or taking action on specific issues without consulting all the Sisters of the DSC specified that such actions were taken by the elected members of the DSC.

In response to the World Hunger crisis, the DSC moved to form an ad hoc committee which would develop an action plan. The plan would have to receive final approval by the DSC before implementation.

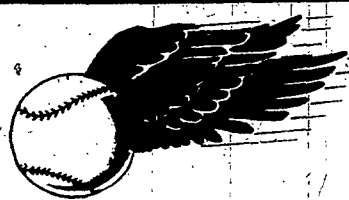
