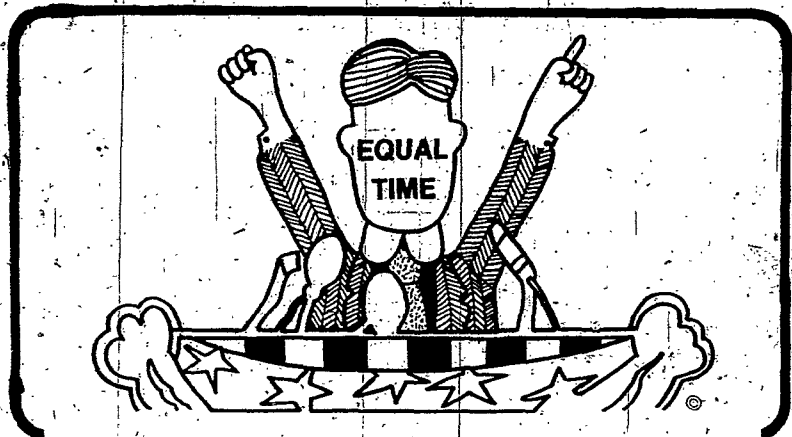

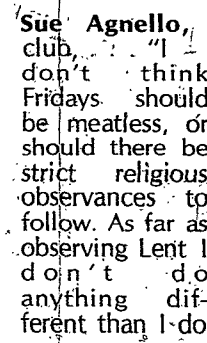
What does Lent mean to you, and how are you observing it?

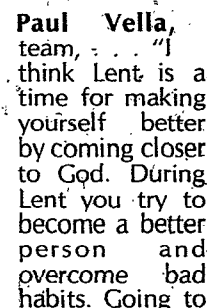
