However, it is definitely not the sex of the priest that is important in resembling Christ; rather it is this person's love for God and each human being, and desire to spread the Word of the Lord that must take precedence here.

Mooney Senior Winner


Linda Rotert, a senior at Cardinal Mooney High School has been named a 1974-75 Betty Crocker Family Leader of Tomorrow. She won the honor by competing with other seniors in the written knowledge and attitude examination on Dec. 3. She is now eligible for state and national honors and will receive a specially designed award from General Mills, inc., sponsor of the annual educational scholarship program.

State winners receive a \$1,500 college scholarship while state second-place winners receive a grant of \$500. The state winner also earns for his or her school, a 20-volume reference work, "The Annals of America," from Encyclopedia Britannica Educational Corp.


