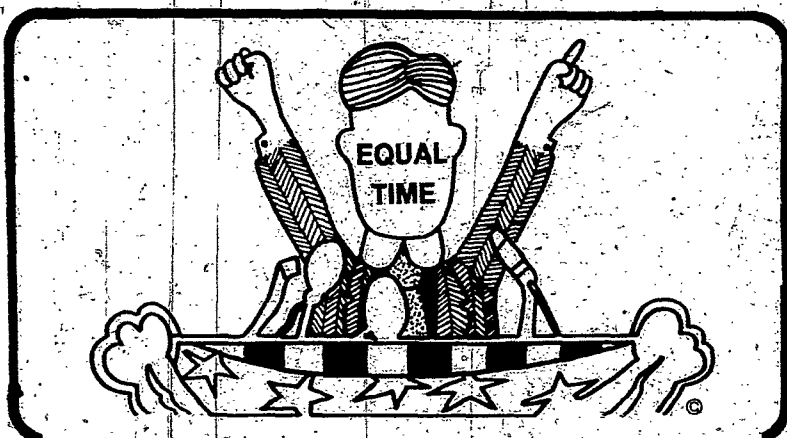

'Life Styles' Seminar Held

The marriage classes of Nazareth Academy attended a seminar on "Life Styles" March 11, at the Sacred Heart Rectory, Mark Hare, instructor of the marriage classes, arranged this seminar to let the students talk to people with various life styles. He said that he is trying to develop the idea that marriage can no longer be defined narrowly, in terms of traditional values, habits and expectations, that each marriage is and should be unique and that a variety of "Life" options exist within the marital framework.
