Role of Doctor-Lecturer

What would you do if you had to give a sex education course to a freshman class of 300 boys and girls? Perhaps you would be as nervously tongue-tied as I would be, and resort to the birds-bees and stork fantasies.

Arthur Florack. gynecologist, who conducts a human sexuality course for Cardinal Mooney freshmen is one person, however, who tackles sex education with aplomb. His realistic attitude and genuine enthusiasm in helping young men and women are the ingredients which make his lectures a success. His relaxed and confident manner immediately creates a rapport between himself_and his voung audiences.

This is not a new venture for the doctor as he began his sex education courses about eight years, ago, and now he and Mrs. Florack travel throughout the state giving lectures and showing film strips on anatomy, and abortion.

His seminars not only deal with the above matters but also with conception, pregnancy, venereal disease, contraception, the psychological and moral aspects of sex as well as femaleness and

"The kids are super," remarked Dr. Florack, and smiled as he spoke about some of their questions which are believable." Asked if these questions ever made him want to run and hide he laughlingly said, 'Rarely.'

Parents are invited to the



lectures, and according to the doctor those that do come are approving though he admits there are some objections to various parts of his program — the discussions on venereal disease, adoption, and showing of the abortion film.

Two Mooney parents discussed their opinions with this reporter and both were impressed with Dr. Florack's handling of all subject matter Mrs. Mary Ann Keefer agreed with the doctor that showing the abortion film would impress upon the students what abortion really is.

Though Mrs. Ann Murray said the movie generally shocked some of the youngsters she maintained, "I feel by the time they are in the minth grade they should be able to absorb this kind of shock." She noted there were mothers who did not feel this

type movie was necessary. Mrs. Murray found the seminar to be educational and stated, "Dr. Florack did a fine job in presenting the physiological

What was the young adult reaction? "I thought it was good," said Dave Lilly, "the doctor was frank and he knew what he was talking about." In regards to the abortion film Dave commented, "It's scary. If you think of it (the baby) as yourself you wouldn't be

Missy Cretelle declared, "He explained everything real well. They (Doctor and Mrs. Florack) show the movie to prove to the people who believe in abortion what really happens to the baby.

"He was very detailed, and knew what he was talking about," said Rob Fagan and added, "the doctor said he didn't show us the movie to 'gross' us out, but to show us that the baby is really going to die."

Dr. Florack explained his lecturing as "basically giving the kids information which makes up for the misinformation or no information al all." In his opening remarks he noted, "back in the dark ages when we (adults) were growing up, sex wasn't talked about" well the doctor not only talks about sex but he defines and clarifies all aspects surrounding this important part of being human.

His candidness in dealing with the subject is welcomed by the young adults as Anne Seccombe pointed out, "He didn't use technical words, but words we could understand.
