## Going to the Doctor. Pays Off for Mercy

Mercy High, coached by Sister Cathy Pfleger, defeated St. Agnes, 58-24, and Bishop Kearney, 62-36, in Private-Parochial League girls basketball games last week

The victories were Mercy's ninth and tenth straight without a loss to league opponents this

The victories also locked up the fourth straight league championship for Mercy, with Cardinal Mooney finishing a distant second with an 8-2 winloss record.

What's Mercy's secret?

"Talent," answers the coach, plus going to clinics and taking advantage of what the basketball doctors at those clinics have to

We happen to be fortunate to have some very good athletes at Mercy," Sister Cathy explains.

'Coaching isn't anything unless you have the athletes," she says, and we just happen to have

Sister Cathy admits she doesn't miss a clinic and she must have taken a lot of notes at the Kodaksponsored women's basketball clinic held in Rochester in

"We picked up a lot of ballhandling tips, game-condition practice drills and various shooting and offensive and defensive tactics.

They (Kodak) brought in the best coaches in the country and there's no doubt that going to the clinics pays off," Sister Cathy

Mercy takes its 10-0 slate into the second round of the Section 5, Class A girls basketball tournament Friday against an unnamed opponent (check daily newspapers for game details) and Sister Cathy hopes her team can improve last year's sectional

"We lost to Brockport in the first round, 36-35; We were down by ten points at halftime and almost caught them. I could have croaked," she says.

The sectionals won't be a pushover — Mercy scrimmaged City League power Franklin, and lost; and Monroe County powers Webster Schroeder and Greece Olympia, and lost both.

Mercy did deféat Eastridge and Penfield in a pair of scrimmages with the county league teams.

Mercy led St. Agnes and Kearney all the way in their league games played last week.

Mercy led St. Agnes, 16-6, 32-12, and 48-20 at the whistle breaks, and was ahead of Kearney, 14-6, 30-17, and 44-25 at the period breaks.

\$ophomore Eileen Smith, the team's leading rebounder (about 20 per game) scored 18 points against St. Agnes and 16 against Kearnev.

"She's a good ball handler, very fast, has a beautiful jump shot from outside, and very rarely fouls despite playing an aggressive ballgame," Sister Cathy explains.

Smith's backcourt teammate is

Judy Peace, the team's best scorer with a 14 point average.

Peace, a 5-7 senior, scored 12 against St. Agnes and had 20 against Kearney.

"Peace enjoys our pressing defense, steals the ball well, is another good outside shooter and is our most accurate free throw shooter — she made 23 of 26 shots from the foul line this season," Sister Cathy explains.

Patti Van Hove. sophomore, isn't a high scorer, but plays the middle position on Mercy's three-player defensive press, Sister Cathy says, between Peace and 5-5 senior Ellen

Hammele, who scored 16 against St. Agnes and 10 against Kearney, is a co-captain (along with Peace) and has a good set shot when the opponents give her

Hammele is also very strong and quick defensively and averages about a dozen steals per

Dianne Schmidt, another 5-8 sophomore, completes Mercy's starting five. She is a good rebounder, likes to shoot inside and underneath, and is especially adept at putting rebounds back in the hoop, Sister Cathy says.

Mercy reserves include 5-4 senior Telana Stokes (likes left corner jump shots), 5-5 sophomore Mary Ellen Weber (good defense), 5-7 sophomore Margie Meath (good rebounder), 5-6 freshman Sheila Taillie (quick), 5-7 freshman Kate Dolan (good defense) and 5-0 freshman Maureen O'Heaney (fast and good at stealing the ball).
