'Bread for the World' Is Sisters Council Topic

The Diocesan Sisters' Council has declared its support of Bread for the World, a political action group, and of the continuation of the St. Mary's Hospital obstetrical

Bread for the World mainly directs its efforts toward changing legislation to help ease world hunger. The DSC urged every religious house in the diocese to back the organization, after they had reviewed data and statistics on the food situation supplied by the Office of Human Development.

Sister Clarice Correla of the Daughters of Charity brought the DSC up to date on the hospital controversy in the Rochester area. Currently, the Genesee Region Health Planning Council

has directed the Monroe County Health Council's Hospital Committee to recommend which of the five Rochester hospital's OB facilities should be consolidated with another unit. The DSC voted to write a letter as a diocesan body to the Genesee Health Council urging the continuation of St. Mary's OB facility. The action was taken at the monthly meeting, last Saturday at Mercy Mother house.

Support was also given to the development of a Narcotics Guidance Council Rochester area. David Moynihan, head of NGC, explained in an informational report that the council would establish neighborhood treatment centers where individuals with drug problems could seek immediate help.

Parish Agency Announced By Education Department

representative group of principals, religious education coordinators and lay educational leadership have been working since November on creating an agency which will deliver a broad comprehensive program of Christian educational services to subscribing parishes.

The plan for this, "Northeast Christian Education Institute" was the inspiration of a group of Christian educators in the Northeast, working with Dr. Padraic O'Hare, the diocesan educational planning consultant.

Dr. O'Hare explains: "The idea behind the institute is simplicity itself. We know that even parishes with professional general, and religious educations on their pastoral staff cannot create and sustain the kind of high quality broad-scale teacher training and adult education programs that are going to be extensive enough to give solid foundation to the adult learner or numerous enough to fulfill the many educational needs of the adult community. But when the efforts of the professional in 20 or 30 parishes are joined and given some structure of permanence then we are unloosing an enormous energy.

The institute program includes courses and in service in basic theology and methodolgy for catechists, minicourses on sacraments, special Education Program, fundamentals of Catholic belief courses to update

adult Christians, courses specially designed for Catholic school faculties, advanced courses for experienced catechists and three special programs on spirituality lenten and advent programs and a full-day workshop on using artistic media in Religious Education. More than 30 courses will be offered

'Like so many hopes, the institute depends for its success on financial support," explains Sister Ellen Galvin, Religious Education director of Holy Spirit in Penfield "If a sufficient number of parishes buy into the institute, then the cost to each should be relatively small. But we won't khow whether our work is successful until a pre-registration process tells us how many participants we will have and how much income we will receive."

Income will be used to hire a full-time coordinator for the institute and purchase materials and supplies.

The institute program will be offered especially to approximately 30 parishes on the Northeast, North and Southeast regions and Wayne County, but will be open to all. While not strictly a regional effort, the inspiration has come from the Northeast, and the planning has been encouraged by the Regional Coordinator Father Thomas Burn and assistant coordinator, Conrad Scheg. According to Sister Anne Mary, the ordination of women is a question of justice. It is not a theological problem she said, but a sociological one, because women are not specifically prohibited from becoming priests.

The Executive Committee approved a \$34,000 sum requested by Bishop Joseph L. Hogan as the Diocesan Bicentennial budget. The sisters felt that the money could be raised through parishioner contrabutions in gratitude for the freedom of religion offered in this

Bishop Gumbleton was recently re-elected vice president of Bread for the World, a citizen's group which seeks to link the


