The Equal Rights Amendment

- 1. Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any te on account of sex
- 2. The Congress shall have the power to enforce by appropriated legislation the provisions of the article.
- 3. This amendment shall take effect two years after the date of ratification.

The opponents of ERA, in quoting the Yale Law Journal (April, 1971) "take quotes out of context, cut off sentences, leave out parts of paragraphs, twist it around, and essentially make whole sections mean what they don't mean at all," Thomas I.
