LAYMAN HONORED

Washington, D.C. [RNS] John E. Cosgrove, a former presidential adviser who later served as director of the U.S. Catholic Conferences' offices of Social Development and Urban Affairs, was honored by Pope Paul for his work with the USCC and awarded the knighthood in the Order of St. Gregory the Great. Cosgrove, a native of Iowa who holds a law degree from the University of Notre Dame, directed the Office of Regional Development of the U.S. Commerce Department from 1967 to 1969; was an assistant director of the Office of Emergency Preparedness for Presidents Eisenhower, Kennedy and Johnson from 1961 to 1967 and earlier served with the U.S. Department of Labor.
