New York [RNS] — For the first time in several years, Catholic press circulation throughout North America has shown an across-the-board increase. Overall, the readership in the Catholic press of North America rose 725,481 — from 22,767,256 in 1974 to 23,792,737 in 1975.

Catholic newspapers in the United States showed an increase of 52,000. The rest of the increase was largely in the magazine field.

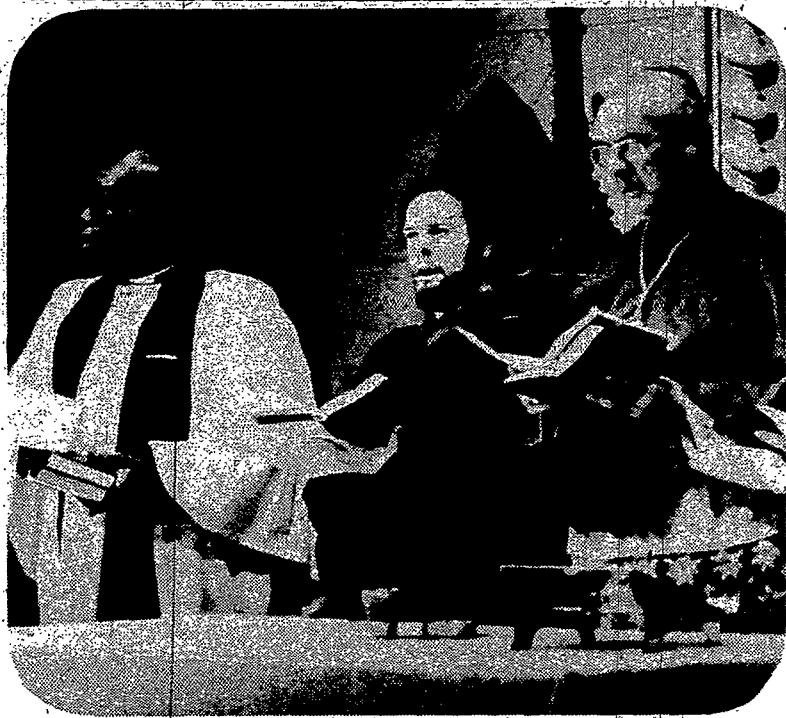
