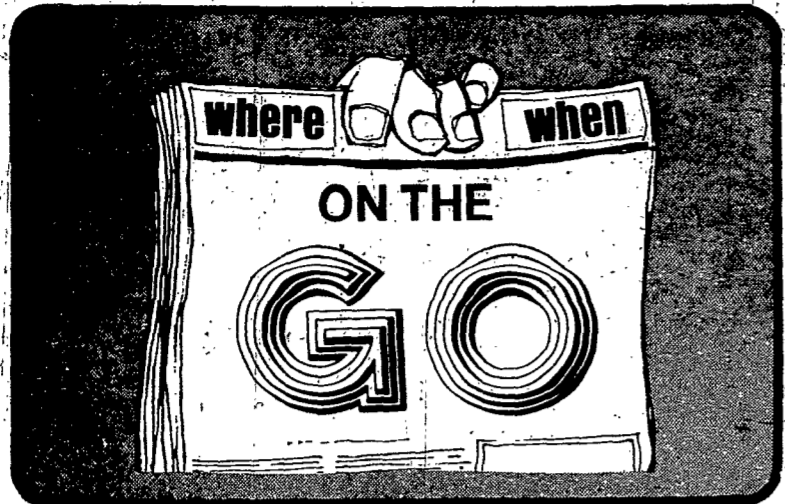

## Glee Club To Perform

The St. Agnes High School Glee Club has accepted an invitation of the National Music Educators Association to perform at their annual convention in Philadelphia April 18-21. The Glee Club is one of two choral groups that will perform at the conference, and was chosen on the basis of a taped audition.

The 70-member Glee Club will perform works from all periods, including chant, polyphony, classical contemporary, and

works which will commemorate America's bicentennial celebration.

The Glee Club which performed two years ago at the Fastman Theatre for the State Music Teachers Convention is directed by Sister Virginia Hogan. Besides being the director of the Sisters of St. Joseph Concert Chorale, Sister Virginia is vice president of the State Choral Conductors Guild, a member of the American Choral Directors

Association, the Monroe County Music Teachers Association, the diocesan music commission and has toured with the Westminster Choir under the direction of Robert Shaw.

The Glee Club is composed of students in grades 10-12 who are selected on the basis of audition. The girls raised money for the trip through the sale of light bulbs, baked goods, and car washes. The trip will include a day of sight-seeing in historic Philadelphia.

# McQuaid Runners Hope for Inside Track

McQuaid lost to Aquinas, 87-49, in the final meet of the City-Catholic League track season last year and lost the championship in the process to the Little Irish.

This season McQuaid coach Bob Bradley sees things differently, not because the Knights have gained any superstars overnight, but because McQuaid, as he assesses the situation, hasn't lost as much strength through graduation as the Little Irish have.

Bradley also likes Monroe as a darkhorse contender for the City-Catholic League crown, along with his Knights and Aquinas, of course.

He sees the three-City-Catholic League teams giving Monroe County track powers Rush-Henrietta and Greece Arcadia a run for the roses come Section 5 time in June.

Aquinas lost, according to

Bradley, its two best high jumpers, its best hurdler, its two best sprinters and quarter-miler — "quite a few first places from our last year's meet," he says.

But Bradley also admits the Irish have a few built-in first places practically assured again by the presence of veterans Glen Williams (discus) and Dan Mastrella (shot put), both of whom will pick up a lot of points for the Dewey Avenue boys this Spring.

The nucleus of McQuaid's 1975 edition comes from its cross-country team, also coached by Bradley.

And the Knights' two-mile indoor relay team is expected to provide much of the excitement in particular, since it won the state winter track indoor two-mile relay with a 7:59.6, was second in the Easterns, and owns the second-fastest high school time for the event in the country with a 7:54.7.

Bradley is high on his two-mile quartet of junior Tom Lott, senior John Farrell, junior Tom Horton and senior Tim Lawrence.

Lott is the Knights' leadoff runner and was runnerup in the Section 5 indoor, 600-yard run; Farrell is the team's best miler (4:21.8 last year) who also runs the half and quarter mile; Horton (brother of Chris and Phil, who Bradley says may exceed his brothers' track achievements at McQuaid) could be McQuaid's best quarter-miler with his terrific speed; and Lawrence, co-captain, ran the key leg of the Knights' state championship indoor two mile relay with a 1:57.7 quarter.

Bradley isn't overlooking Aquinas senior Leo Finucane who he says knocked the socks off his 880 hotshots in last year's McQuaid-Aquinas showdown.

"Finucane won the dual meet against us last year and was second in the sectional 880. He also runs on the Aquinas mile

relay team. He's a very versatile runner," Bradley explains.

He expects seniors Kevin Burnett and Jack Reiser to lower last year's two-mile times of 9:43 each, to 9:30 this season, and says junior Dave Aha and sophomore Tom Argentero could surprise as a couple of unheralded sprinters.

Senior Brian Hart returns as the Knights' top hurdler. Hart, who played basketball and ran cross country, owns the McQuaid 330 intermediate school hurdles mark with a :41.2 and has done :15.2 in the 120 highs.

Backing Hart in the 120 highs is senior Jerry Cushman who did a :16.1 last year.

Others whom Bradley is depending on for Knight points include high jumper John Labinski, pole vaulter Chris Poluikis, long jumpers Dan Hasset and Cushman (Hasset also triple jumps), and senior shot putter Jim Celentani who Bradley says will break the

Knights' school mark this season with a 50-foot heave.

McQuaid lost discus thrower Mike Hanna via graduation after he set a new school mark with a 149.7; but Bradley is banking on senior Paul Rokas, a 6-1, 195-pound football defensive end/offensive tackle, to break the record with a 150-foot throw this spring.

While all seems positive on the surface, Bradley says his "turnout" for this season was the lowest in several years.

"We had only 60 out this year compared with 100 in past years. We do have good returning talent, but this may create quite a scramble for depth in making up our relay teams," Bradley says.

"But we expect to do well with what we have," he adds, and the rest of the City-Catholic League would surely nod their heads in agreement.
