British Author Nazareth Speaker

A British author-lecturer who has gained international recognition as a "leading Christian thinker and writer" will deliver the commencement address to a record number of graduates at Nazareth College Sunday, May 11 at noon.

Rosemary Haughton, author of 29 books, lecturer and British television personality, will address Nazareth'a largest graduating class, 526 students, during ceremonies that will officially mark the end of the college's 50th anniversary year. Mrs. Haughton, also will receive an honorary degree, the 16th in the college's history.

Nazareth's 1975 graduating class includes 266 students who have earned the bachelor's degree and 260 who have earned the master of science in education degree. For the first time in Nazareth's history, commencement ceremonies will take place under a tent to assure weather-proof accommodations for the anticipated record number of onlookers.

Many of Mrs. Haughton's books, magazine articles and columns deal with theology, developing her thesis that a living theology grows out of experience — the experience of God in man's life which inspires man to new ways of expressing God.


