The first meeting of the Chesterton Society in this area will take place at 8 p.m. Thursday, May 29 at the Nazareth College Library. It will be, preceded by a dinner at 6:15 at The Depot restaurant in Pittsford. Anyone interested in Gilbert, Keith Chesterton and his writings will be welcome.

Chesterton Society meetings are planned from Boston to San Diego from June through August. The Rochester meeting, on GKC's 101st birthday, will be the first in the hemisphere, according to Robert Knille, local represen-

Vice-presidents include Dorothy Collins, GKC's last secretary and his literary executrix; John Sullivan, the Chesterton bibliographer and editor; Maurice Reckitt, the Anglican social critic and author, who was an associate of both Chesterton and T.S. Eliot; Cardinal Flahiff, the Archbishop of Winnipeg, and Justice Cartwright, former Chief Justice of the Canadian Supreme Court.

G. K. Chesterton (1874-1936) was a popular writer of essays, novels, biographies, literary criticism, short stories, plays, and poems. Many Catholics consider him a great apologist for the Church, with his optimistic affirmation of orthodox Christian
