

One of the founders of the Catholic Charismatic Renewal movement has come out with what has been described as a "public, radical, negative criticism" of it. Notre Dame scholar Dr. William Storey, in an interview appearing in A.D. Correspondence, calls for an investigation of the movement to safeguard "authentic Catholic tradition and the rights of conscience." He also warns that if movement experiences a "flat condemnation" by the Catholic hierarchy "there will be a schism. "... Although the military draft ended June 30, 1973, the Selective Service system has remained in existence at a cost exceeding \$106 million. This is "a rip-off" and "an affront to every American taxpayer," Father Robert F. Drinan told his colleagues in the House of Representatives. "This is an unbelievable case of a bureaucracy existing solely for its own sake," the Massachusetts Democrat declared. He joined Sen. William Proxmire (D. Wis.) in sponsoring legislation to phase out the system ... Father Avery Dulles, SJ, a professor of systematic theology at Catholic University of America, said recently that he saw "no dogmatic obstacle" to the ordination of women to the priesthood, but that he thought most lay people were not ready for this change. His speech at Georgetown University was devoted largely to criticism of unnamed "liberal reformers" who he said were influenced too much by secular culture

The ancient vaults of St. Peter's Basilica were filled with the sound of rock guitars last week at a Mass closing the four-day International Congress on Charismatic Renewal in the Catholic Church. More than 10,000 were present in Rome for the event. Vatican Radio cited instances of glossolalia, faith healing and prophesy during the congress In Australia, Father Patrick Dodson, 27, has been ordained that country's first Aboriginal priest. A member of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart, Father Dodson says he hopes to use the traditional values of his people and mesh them with aspects of Christian belief. "In this way," he says, "the full richness of Aboriginal culture can flow on into the Christianity of my people."

# Bill Permits Hospitals to Bar Abortion

**Ålbany, N.Y. [RNS]** — The New York State Senate has passed a bill that would allow hospitals to refuse to perform abortions. The vote was 34-24. Sen. James Griffin (D-Buffalo), principal sponsor of the measure, said it would also protect the civil rights of people opposed to abortions.

Sen. John Caemmerers (R-Nassau) said the bill would be a proper protest to the U.S. Supreme Court's landmark ruling on abortions.

Sen. Carol Bellamy (D-Brooklyn) said the bill was "absolutely unconstitutional" and that "as lawmakers we have a responsibility to this nation and the state" to uphold the Constitution.

A spokesman for the New York State Catholic Conference said that although his organization supported the bill, it had not been pressing as vigorously as the right-to-life organization because it had not found any difficulty
