Gallo Boycott Should Continue

Editor:

In light of the recent support Gallo Wines has offered to the Brown Bill (which would guarantee free secret ballot elections to the farm workers), it is important to understand that the boycott of Gallo wines must continue if the full right of the farm workers to freely choose a representative union is to be achieved.

It is encouraging, but surprising, that Gallo has decided to support the Brown Bill. If Gallo is genuinely committed to the farm workers' right to free secret ballot elections, it need not wait for legislation to be passed. Indeed, if Gallo chooses to wait, its decision should be viewed with caution and perhaps suspicion.

The mechanisms for an independently supervised free secret ballot election are already available and could hasten the arrival of the justice so richly deserved by the farm workers. If Gallo chooses to wait for the passage of the Brown Bill, it would mean a delay of at least another year before elections could be held. We must not forget that the farm workers have been on strike for two years already and that they have endured hardships that few of us can imagine in their quest for justice.

Although community support for the boycott has been encouraging and is growing stronger, we must not let Gallo's recent position lead us to conclude that we need no longer be vigilant in our efforts. If we continue to boycott Gallo products, we will ensure a successful outcome for the farm workers.

Parish Missions Alive and Well

A few days ago, one of our priests sent me a clipping from your paper, with a letter to the editor inquiring about Parish Missions. Mr. Kernan, the writer, was concerned about the disappearance of such parish programs.

I would like to inform him and other interested parties that the Parish Mission is alive and doing well. The priest who sent me the clipping was, in fact, one of two Passionists conducting a two week Mission at St. Francis de Sales Parish, Geneva, from May 11-24.

I have been director of the Passionist Preaching Apostolate for the past ten years. During this period of time, our Community has conducted over two thousand Parish Missions along the north-eastern section of our country. In 1974, we conducted 140 Missions. Presently, we have 30 priests engaged in this work. Three more were just assigned to this apostolate as of May 28.

We offer a variety of formats today, ranging from a more traditional to a more contemporary approach. While many requests still come in from pastors, there is a growing trend to have parish councils and other parish groups initiate such moves and carry them through.
