Billed as "a game of body language for the uninhibited", "Showoffs" in reality is another game of charades with teams competing to guess the same, clues. The contestants are both celebrities and people taken from the audience who have ostensibly demonstrated ability to become hyper in front of the camera. They may be having fun but very little is enjoyed by the TV fan. On a scale of 1 to 10 this one gets a 2.

Musical Chairs is seen at 4 p.m. on Channel 10, replacing Tattle Tales, which has moved to an 11 a.m. slot. With Adam Wade as emcee this show has contestants trying to guess the next line of a song. To help them along singers belt out two or three sets of lyrics, all of which sound plausible if you don't know the right words. This one rates a 3.

Rhyme and Reason, seen afternoons at 2:30 on Channel 13, has stars finishing rhyming couplets hoping to hit upon three pre-selected words. It requires a little more mental ability on the part of the celebrities than say "Showoffs" but not much. This gets a 3 also.

The Magnificent Marble Machine, seen at noon on Channel 8, makes no sense to me whatsoever. I only watched it once but was too bored to try it again. Art James is the star of this
